ReNYlet 3-22-62 requesting Bureau authority to interview John Henrik Clarke concerning his association with captioned organization.

Authority to conduct this interview at this time is denied. Relet describes Clarke as an editor of "Freedomways," the new Negro quarterly. Because of this association New York should reopen its file on Clarke and conduct appropriate investigation to determine Clarke's activities in this regard. The Bureau should be furnished a resume of the information obtained along with recommendations as to whether an investigation of Clarke is warranted. This information should be furnished under Clarke's caption with a copy designated for the Bureau file on Freedomways Associates, Inc.

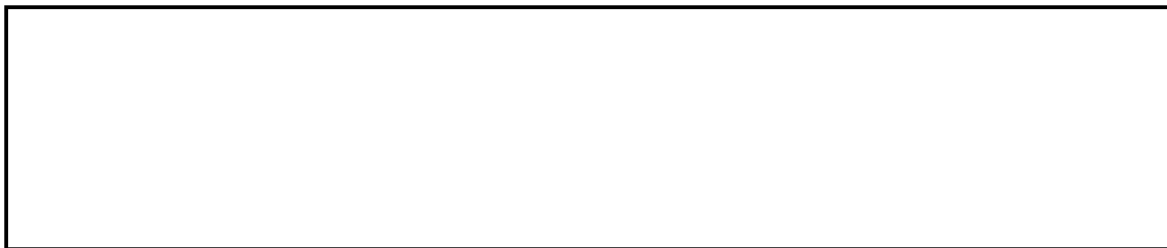

CLARKE interviewed 1/10/62, and gave details of his trip to Cuba. CLARKE denied ever writing brochures or pamphlets for any foreign government dealing with racial conditions in the US. CLARKE denied any knowledge of the riot that occurred at the UN Headquarters, NYC, 1961, and also denied ever having membership in the CP. Description set forth.

JOHN HENRIK CLARKE advised that he visited Cuba at the behest of a cultural committee in Cuba who sponsored the trip of various writers and journalists. He stated he spent approximately eight days in Cuba visiting various historic sites. He advised that he wanted to go, not because he was impressed by the Cuban revolution, but because he was impressed by the fact that people who had lived in abject poverty all their lives, as he had done throughout his childhood, were able to do something to better themselves. He advised that his expenses were all paid for by this cultural committee in Cuba. He related that he could not recall the exact date of his visit but believed it was a few days prior to the July 26th celebration and a few days after the celebration in 1960. Mr. CLARKE declared that it was the understanding of all the writers who made this trip to Cuba that they were perfectly free to write anything that they wished to and that they were not pressured to slant their writings regarding the trip.

CLARKE advised that he was never approached by anyone to write a pamphlet or a brochure regarding racial conditions in the United States for publication in Cuba. He stated that while he was visiting in Cuba he had spoken to several editors about racial problems and he told them that he believed that American authorities or American writers should be the ones who would write about racial problems in the United States to clear up any misconceptions or misinformation that the Cuban people may have had about this condition. He advised

that sometime after his return from Cuba he heard from these editors and he sent them a copy of his book entitled "The Black Christ", which book consists of seventeen short stories. He advised that he never heard from the editors again nor does he know if his book was reprinted in the Spanish language in Cuba.

Mr. CLARKE stated that he never had a thing to do with, nor did he have any knowledge of the riot which occurred at the United Nations during Ambassador STEVENSON's speech. He stated that the first thing he knew about this incident that occurred at the United Nations was when he read of it in the newspapers.

Mr. CLARKE advised that he was never approached directly by anyone from a European publishing house to publish or to write any type of pamphlet or brochure regarding conditions in the United States. He did state, however, that approximately one year ago a friend of his, unnamed, in Chicago advised CLARKE that a publisher in Czechoslovakia was interested in publishing material on Africa. This friend suggested to CLARKE that perhaps this Czechoslovakian publisher would be interested in CLARKE's book entitled "Great African Chiefs." CLARKE advised that this book of his has never been published and he has spent a great deal of time and effort in an endeavor to have it published. He sent a copy of his book, "Great African Chiefs" to this Czechoslovakian publisher and has never heard from them since. CLARKE stated that he was never approached by any foreign government either in Europe or anywhere else to write any type of pamphlet or brochure dealing with problems in the United States or anything having to do with Africa.

When questioned as to whether or not he had ever been a member of the Communist Party of the United States, CLARKE stated that he had never belonged to this party at any time in his life.

CLARKE stated that he had been a subscriber to the "Daily Worker" but he cannot recall the year. He stated that his subscription was only for a very short while and he did not read the paper because of any liking for the Communist philosophy,

but he read it because on many occasions there were good articles in it from various Negro writers.

Regarding his own political activity or affiliation, CLARKE stated he has attended meetings of every type of political group that has ever held a meeting in New York City; however, he advised that he has never belonged to any group. He stated that he considers himself a liberal democrat since a party must register for some political party.

CLARKE advised that in his application for a position with the United States Information Agency he had put in that he had been employed for six years with a broadcasting company. CLARKE advised that this was not entirely true but he had worked for six years at that National Broadcasting Company cleaning up while employed by the City Service Cleaning Contractors, who had been engaged by the National Broadcasting Company to clean the various studios.

CLARKE advised that his reason for making application for a position with the United States Information Agency was that on his various trips abroad, especially in Africa and Italy, he found that personnel of the United States Information Agency had a complete lack of knowledge of the customs and culture of the country they were serving in. He advised that he especially noted this regarding the Negro members of the United States Information Agency who were serving in Africa. He stated that none of them seemed to know the culture, language, or background of the section of Africa that they were serving in and he felt that it would serve the interests of the United States better if a person who was informed would make application for a position and serve.

CLARKE advised, with regard to his allegedly holding a position at the New School for Social Research, that he had merely been a guest lecturer on a very few occasions on the subject of Africa and it has been over two years since he has performed this type of service for this school.

Regarding various Negro nationalist groups in Harlem, New York City, CLARKE said he has never belonged to any groups

of this type. He said that he could not stand for the principals upon which most of these groups are founded and that is the "big lie." He advised that the one thing he has noticed in the Harlem area is that this technique of the "big lie" goes over much better with the average person in Harlem if stated in a loud angry voice than the exact facts or truth of a situation does if stated by a person in a quite sensible voice. He advised that for this reason he has never made any attempt to affiliate himself with any of the Negro nationalist groups.

The Communist Party, USA has been designed by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "Daily Worker" was an East Coast Communist newspaper which ceased publication on January 13, 1958.

On January 20, 1961, the "New York Amsterdam News", a Harlem daily newspaper, reflected an article entitled "JOHN HENRIK CLARKE Weds New York School Teacher". The article reflects that the subject married Miss EUGENIA A. ~~EVANS~~ in Miami, Florida.

The following is a description of the subject, as obtained from personal observation and from the records of his employer:

Concerning CLARKE's activities on behalf of the Negro quarterly publication "Freedomways", which is published by Freedomways Associates Inc., 799 Broadway, NYC, [redacted] furnished information in February, March and April indicating that CLARKE was a member of the staff of this quarterly. However, his exact status was not known until the Spring, 1962 issue of "Freedomways" was published. This issue lists CLARKE, in its listing of the editorial staff, as "Associate Editor".

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NY file 100-98492, which is captioned "Harlem Quarterly, IS-C" reflects that this publication was short lived, with only three editions being published, one in the Winter of 1949 and the other two editions in 1950. CLARKE is listed as one of the Associate Editors of this publication. There was no information developed showing that this publication was Communist inspired or controlled. However, it is noted that one of the contributing editors to this quarterly was SHIRLEY GRAHAM, who is presently the editor of "Freedomways". It is therefore possible that CLARKE knew GRAHAM at the time "Harlem Quarterly" was being published and may be a reason why CLARKE contributed articles to "Freedomways" and why he was selected as an associate editor when one was needed after SHIRLEY GRAHAM went to Ghana with her husband W.E.B. DUBOIS.

In addition to the above, [redacted] furnished information on 4/1/62 reflecting that CLARKE had been assigned by "Freedomways" to cover UN activities for the magazine. A letter was sent to the Press Accreditation Officer at the UN requesting that CLARKE be issued a UN press card and that appropriate facilities be made available to him. This letter further stated that, in addition to being a member of the staff of "Freedomways", CLARKE was presently the Consultant and African Affairs Correspondent for the World Mutual Exchange International News Features.

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From information furnished by [redacted] it appears that CLARKE, in his capacity as Associate Editor, has the task of securing articles for "Freedomways" from prominent Negroes in the US. For example in May, 1962, he sent a letter to [redacted] the newly elected member of the International Executive Board of the UAW Union congratulating him on his election and requesting that he consider submitting an article for the Summer, 1962 issue of "Freedomways", which issue will deal with the economic and political status of Negroes in the US. A similar letter was sent out to [redacted] at Atlanta University, Atlanta, Georgia in April, 1962 in which CLARKE requested an article from [redacted] on MARTIN LUTHER KING for the Summer, 1962 issue.

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No information has been reported concerning any activity on the part of CLARKE with the CPUSA per se. However, [redacted] advised on 4/2/62 that during the evening of 3/31/62, a social and film showing was held under the auspices of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC) at the home of WILLIAM and LOUISE PATTERSON, 1268 President Street, Brooklyn, NY. About 70 persons attended this affair throughout the evening and the FPCC realized a profit of approximately \$52 plus the sale of \$5 worth of literature.

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The informant advised that JOHN CLARKE of "Freedomways" was among those attending this affair and the informant noted that in the course of the evening there was no discussion of the CP or of Communist matters.

As the Bureau is aware, WILLIAM PATTERSON is the Chairman of the NY State CP.

On 3/2/62, [redacted] advised that on 2/17/62, a program was held at a YMCA in Brooklyn, NY in commemoration of Negro History Week. The guest speaker was JOHN H. CLARKE. This affair was sponsored by ^{the} NY Intercultural Society (NYIS) and the affair was mentioned in the "Midweek Worker" and in the "National Guardian".

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On 9/17/59, [redacted] advised that it did not appear tht the NYIS was organized or dominated by the CP, that while some of the members may have been CP members and some probably still were, there was no evidence of CP control. It was the informant's opinion that the policies of the organization and its program were much broader than they would be in a CP front.

Since CLARKE's relationship with "Freedomways" is of an open nature and because no information has been received to show that CLARKE's becoming an Associate Editor was due to any action on the part of the CPUSA, it is not believed that an investigation of CLARKE is warranted at this time.

It appears that CLARKE's activities are primarily directed toward the enlightenment and interest of the Negro rather than fostering the organizational interest of the CP. Through the investigation of Freedomways Associates, the NYO will follow closely CLARKE's relationship with it and its organizational ties to the CP, USA. Should CLARKE become organizationally involved with the CP, USA, the NYO will make a separate recommendation favoring investigation of CLARKE.

Included was a letter dated 1/4/63, from JOHN HENRIK CLARKE to a [redacted] Seven Seas Books, Berlin, German Democratic Republic. In this letter, CLARKE states that they had received the books which were sent to them and added that they always would be interested in reviewing books on the list of Seven Seas which relate to the people of Africa, Asia, and people of African descent in the western world.

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There are enclosed for the Bureau nine copies of a letterhead memorandum reflecting the information contained in this letter as well as a copy of the letter itself.

It is believed that [redacted] mentioned in the letterhead memorandum, is [redacted] the subject of Bufile 100-379980, NY file 100-104206. The second and third sources mentioned in the letterhead memorandum, in the characterization of [redacted] are [redacted] (Deceased) and [redacted]

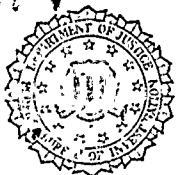

On January 13, 1963, a confidential source furnished information reflecting that on January 4, 1963, John Henrik Clarke of "Freedomways" Magazine communicated with [redacted]

[redacted] advising her that they had received the books which she had sent to them. He added that, at "Freedomways" they always will be interested in reviewing books on the Seven Seas list that relate in any way to the people of Africa, Asia, and the people of African descent in the western world. Clarke stated that a review of a book which had been sent to them has already been written for the Winter issue of "Freedomways", a copy of which should reach [redacted] in February. Clarke further requested review copies of several Seven Seas Books.

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Clarke requested that [redacted] give their best regards to [redacted] whom they hope will be able to contribute to the Summer, 1963 issue of "Freedomways". The Fall, 1962 issue of "Freedomways" identifies John Henrik Clarke as an associate editor.

The January 14, 1952 issue of the "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist newspaper which ceased publication on January 13, 1958, page eight, reflects that [redacted]

was a member of the faculty of the Jefferson School of Social Science (JSSS) for the Winter term beginning January 21, 1952.

The JSSS has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A second confidential source advised on May 25, 1946, that [redacted] [redacted] was a member of the Communist Party before World War II and had been asked to join the Professional Branch of the Communist Party during 1946.

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The records of the Passport Division, United States Department of State, reflect that [redacted] was issued a passport on January 24, 1952, and that he has lived abroad in France ever since with the exception of the period 1954-1955 when he claimed to have lived in Sweden.

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A third confidential source advised on December 21, 1952, that [redacted] [redacted] who formerly resided in Paris, France, is presently residing in the German Democratic Republic.

The records of the Secretary of State, New York State Department of State, Albany, New York, show that the certificate of incorporation of Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, was filed on March 2, 1961.

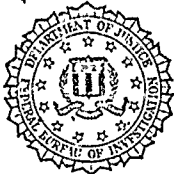
The Spring, 1962, issue of "Freedomways" is self-described as "a Quarterly Review of the Negro Freedom Movement" published by Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, 799 Broadway, New York City.

On May 24, 1961, a source advised that a report was given on "Freedomways" at a meeting of the National Board, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), held on May 24, 1961. It was stated that the original plan called for the publication to be openly Marxist, but that it was later decided it would not be avowedly a Marxist publication. Editorials are in the hands of a mixed group of Marxists and non-Marxists. It was stated that the central purpose of "Freedomways" is to develop a theory and positive criticism of currents in the Negro movement, as well as to raise the level of understanding and discussion taking place in Negro life today and to project a socialist and pro-Soviet orientation.

On May 25, 1961, another source advised that "Freedomways" was set up for the CPUSA by JAMES JACKSON, a member of the National Committee of the CPUSA.

In his post as Associate Editor, CLARKE works with ESTHER JACKSON, the Business Manager of "Freedomways" and wife of JAMES JACKSON.

APPENDIX

FREEDOMWAYS ASSOCIATES, INC.

The records of the New York Secretary of State, Albany, New York, show that the certificate of incorporation of Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, was filed on March 2, 1961.

The Spring, 1963, issue of "Freedomways" is self-described as "A Quarterly Review of the Negro Freedom Movement" published by Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, 799 Broadway, New York City.

On May 24, 1961, a source advised that a report was given on "Freedomways" at a meeting of the National Board, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), held on May 24, 1961. It was stated that the original plan called for the publication to be openly Marxist, but that it was later decided it would not be avowedly a Marxist publication. Editorials are in the hands of a mixed group of Marxists and non-Marxists. It was stated that the central purpose of "Freedomways" is to develop a theory and positive criticism of currents in the Negro movement, as well as to raise the level of understanding and discussion taking place in Negro life today and to project a socialist and pro-Soviet orientation.

On May 25, 1961, another source advised that "Freedomways" was set up for the CPUSA by James Jackson, a member of the National Committee of the CPUSA.

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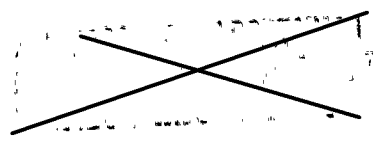

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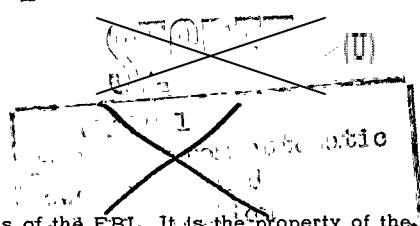

Synopsis:

CLARKE resides at 2186 5th Ave., NYC, and is an Associate Editor of "Freedomways" magazine, a Negro quarterly of the CP, USA, whose Business Manager is ESTHER JACKSON, wife of JAMES JACKSON, Editor of "The Worker". He also has been employed as a porter by City Service Cleaning but left this job on vacation in May, 1963, and expects to return to it in the Fall. CLARKE's name appeared as a contributor to the Marxist magazine "New Foundations" in 1947. He has contributed to other Negro publications, had an article in "Progressive Labor" and has written in the "National Guardian". CLARKE's name appeared on a petition of the Committee to Secure Justice for MORTON SOBELL in 1961. He was advertised as a speaker at a program at Camp Midvale in February, 1962 and was interested in increasing sales of "Freedomways" at this camp. The first meeting of Freedomways Forum was held in his home and he has attended a Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC) affair as well as a fund raising affair at the home of WILLIAM PATTERSON. His name appeared in an FPCC advertisement and he attended a reception for HUGH MULZAC. CLARKE's general activities as Associate Editor of "Freedomways" set out, as well as instances of specific contacts in this position. An informant has expressed the belief that CLARKE is not a CP member because of a comment of ESTHER JACKSON.

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DETAILS:

A. RESIDENCE

On July 24, 1963, [redacted] City Service Cleaning, 10 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, New York, advised that his records reflect that CLARKE's home address is 2186 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

B. EMPLOYMENT

The Spring, 1963, issue of "Freedomways" lists CLARKE as an Associate Editor. CLARKE's name first appeared as an Associate Editor of this magazine in the Spring, 1962, issue and it has been listed in every issue since that time.

A characterization of Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, publishers of the quarterly magazine "Freedomways" is set forth in the appendix pages of this report.

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On July 24, 1963, [redacted] supra, advised that CLARKE had been steadily employed by his company as a porter prior to May 17, 1963, at which time, CLARKE went on a two week vacation. He advised that during the latter part of May, 1963, he received a letter from CLARKE stating that he was unable to return to his job on June 3, 1963, explaining that he had a summer teaching position at an unnamed school in New Jersey, but wanted to be considered for re-employment in the Fall of 1963.

On April 1, 1962, NY T-1 made available information reflecting that ESTHER JACKSON, Managing Editor of the magazine "Freedomways" had written to the Press Accreditation Officer at the United Nations in March, 1962, informing him that CLARKE, a member of the staff of "Freedomways", had been assigned to cover United Nations activities for that publication. She requested that a United Nations press card be issued to him and that appropriate facilities be made available. She added that in addition to his work with the magazine, CLARKE was then the Consultant and African Affairs Correspondent for the World Mutual Exchange International News Features.

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ESTHER JACKSON is the wife of JAMES JACKSON, whom NY T-2, on May 7, 1962, described as a member of the National Committee (NC) of the Communist Party, USA, (CP, USA).

The masthead of "The Worker", an east coast Communist newspaper, July 21, 1963, lists JAMES JACKSON as its Editor.

NY T-1 had furnished information on February 17, 1963 and May 12, 1963, reflecting that CLARKE was drawing a \$60 weekly salary from Freedomways Associates, Inc. (F.A. Inc.)

NY T-3 furnished information on the following dates reflecting that

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NY T-3 also furnished information on April 3, June 4, and August 2, 1962, reflecting that

On October 2, 1962, NY T33 furnished information reflecting that

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The source no longer [redacted] upon which the above information is based and the above information is not to be made public except in the usual proceedings following the issuance of a subpoena duces tecum. The person to be subpoenaed is [redacted]

C. AFFILIATION WITH OTHER PUBLICATIONS

The Fall, 1947, issue of "New Foundations", Volume 1, #1, in its table of contents lists the name of JOHN HENRIK CLARKE as the contributor of poetry on page 43, entitled "And a Challenge Too".

On April 23, 1947, NY T-4 furnished a copy of the "Charter of New Foundations Cooperative", which charter stated that New Foundations Cooperative is a non-profit Marxist cooperative organization of young Americans active in cultural and intellectual pursuits. One of the purposes of this organization is to publish "New Foundations", a Marxist intellectual and cultural youth magazine.

NY T-5 advised on January 15, 1954, that he knew [redacted] as a member of the CP while he was attending Columbia University during 1945-1947. In 1946, this informant stated [redacted] and two others started a magazine called "New Foundations", which was published with CP approval.

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On December 19, 1952, NY T-6 advised that the publication "Harlem Quarterly", now defunct, was a magazine published by Harlem Quarterly Associates, Inc., 974 General Post Office, New York, N. Y. There were just three editions of this magazine published, namely the Winter, 1949, edition;

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the Spring, 1950, edition, and the Fall-Winter, 1950, edition. NY T-6 said that the editorial staff included JOHN H. CLARKE.

The Winter, 1949-1950 edition, contained a prospectus of the quarterly written by the Editor, which states that the purpose of the publication was to bring

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to its readers short stories, poetry and articles on all aspects of Negro life and history. It states that the publication would present "a broad cross section of opinions on problems facing American Negroes, West Indians, Africans and our white allies today".

This issue contains a short story and a feature article by CLARKE.

The "Amsterdam News" of August 5, 1950, page 17, column 1, contains a photograph of the Editor of the "Harlem Quarterly", and "His Associate Editor, JOHN HENRY CLARK".

NY T-7 advised on March 10, 1961, that on March 9, 1961, the Liberation Committee for Africa (LCA) held a Committee and General Planning Meeting in Adelphi Hall, New York City. Among those present was JOHN CLARKE, a Negro.

On March 10, 1961, NY T-7 made available a "Statement of Aims" of the LCA. This statement is as follows:

"The LCA has been founded in the belief that freedom and equality for Americans of African descent is inextricably linked with freedom for Africans in their own home lands. The aims of this Committee have been developed in accordance with this belief.

"To work for and support the immediate liberation of all colonial peoples.

"To provide a public forum for African Freedom Fighters.

"To provide concrete aid to African Freedom Fighters.

"To re-establish awareness of the common cultural heritage of Afro-Americans with their African brothers."

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NY T-8, on July 25, 1961, made available the July, 1961, issue of the publication "Liberator", published by LCA and this issue contains a book review by CLARKE of a book, "Black Muslims in America" by C. ERIC LINCOLN. This publication lists CLARKE as a member of the editorial board and [redacted] as the Editor.

NY T-8, on March 23, 1962, made available the March, 1962, issue of "Liberator", self described as a monthly publication of the LCA and this issue listed CLARKE as a member of the editorial board and [redacted] as the Editor.

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NY T-9 advised on January 10, 1961, that [redacted] attended a meeting of the Peace Club of the Crown Heights Section of the Kings County CP on January 9, 1961 at which meeting [redacted] reregistered himself and his wife as members of the Peace Club.

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"Progressive Labor", which is the issue of February, 1962, Volume 1, #2, contains an article on page 4 by CLARKE entitled "Victory in Flower Hospital Strike". This article praises the tactics used by the strikers in achieving a victory in a strike at Flower Hospital, New York City, and criticizes police action against the strikers.

A characterization of "Progressive Labor" appears in the appendix pages of this report.

The "National Guardian" of February 14, 1963, page 8, contains an article by CLARKE, "The Reason a Negro History Week was Needed". CLARKE is identified as an Associate Editor of "Freedomways" and in the article explains the origin of "Negro History Week", its purpose and meaning.

The "National Guardian" of March 21, 1963, page 10, contains a review by CLARKE of the book, "The Fire Next Time" by JAMES BALDWIN.

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A characterization of the "National Guardian" is set forth in the appendix pages of this report.

D. OTHER ACTIVITIES

In November, 1961, the Internal Security Division of the Department of Justice, made available a petition of the Committee to Secure Justice for MORTON SOBELL, which was a petition to the President seeking a new trial for SOBELL or an executive pardon or commutation of his sentence. This petition contains the name of JOHN CLARKE, 311 West 136th Street, New York City.

A characterization of the Committee to Secure Justice for MORTON SOBELL is set forth in the appendix pages of this report.

On February 13, 1962, NY T-10 and on April 2, 1962, NY T-11 made available similar circulars advertising a weekend at Camp Midvale, N. J., February 10, 11 and 12, 1962. The program for Saturday afternoon lists "JOHN HENRY CLARK, Distinguished Journalist and Author", who was to speak on the Negro and American history.

A characterization of Camp Midvale, under the heading of Metropolitan Recreation Association, is set forth in the appendix pages of this report.

On May 20, 1962, NY T-1 made available information reflecting that on May 8, 1962, CLARKE advised the Manager of Camp Midvale of plans to visit that camp during the Spring and Summer. CLARKE also expressed the hope that more copies of "Freedomways" could be sold at Camp Midvale during the Spring and Summer months.

NY T-1 furnished information on June 24, 1962, reflecting that on June 15, 1962, CLARKE advised Camp Midvale that he would be happy to speak at the camp on weekends, but could not take any engagement during the

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week. He expressed the intention of going to the camp to try and boost the sale of "Freedomways".

"The Worker", February 14, 1962, page 7, column 2, contains an article, "Negro History Celebration", which states that CLARKE, an Editor of "Freedomways", would speak on February 17, 1962, at the Bedford YMCA, under the sponsorship of the New York Intercultural Society (NYIS). It states that CLARKE had spent several months in Africa as a correspondent for United States Negro and English newspapers last year.

On September 17, 1959, NY T-12 advised that it did not appear that the NYIS was organized or dominated by the CP and that while some of its members may have been members of the CP, and some probably still were, there was no evidence of CP control.

On March 2, 1962, NY T-13 advised that on February 17, 1962, a program was held at the YMCA, Bedford Section, Brooklyn, N. Y., in commemoration of Negro History Week and that JOHN H. CLARKE was the guest speaker.

NY T-14 advised on March 21, 1963, that on March 18, 1963, a meeting of CP members was held to discuss plans for Freedomways Forum. It was brought out at this meeting that the first meeting of the organization was scheduled for March 22, 1963 at the apartment of JOHN CLARKE, 2186 Fifth Avenue, New York City. ESTHER JACKSON, who was present, brought out that she did not want the speakers for these meetings to be known as Marxists or CP members. She stressed that she wanted non-CP people present.

NY T-14 further advised on March 21, 1963, that it had been brought out at previous meetings of [redacted]

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[redacted] that the aim of Freedomways Forum is to recruit people into the CP. The organization membership was to be made up of non-CP people, but the leadership itself was to be made up of CP members.

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On March 21, 1963, NY T-14 described [redacted] and [redacted] as CP members. *USIA*
of the Communist Party

NY T-15 advised on November 8, 1962, that WILLIAM ALBERTSON is the Executive Secretary of the New York District CP.

On April 2, 1962, NY T-8 advised that on March 31, 1962, a social and film showing was held at the home of WILLIAM PATTERSON, 1268 President Street, Brooklyn, N. Y., under the auspices of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC). JOHN CLARKE of "Freedomways" was among the approximately 70 persons who attended this affair. During the evening there was no discussion of the CP or of Communist matters.

A characterization of the FPCC is set forth in the appendix pages of this report.

NY T-16 advised on February 11, 1963, that as of February, 1963, WILLIAM PATTERSON was identified as Chairman of the New York District CP.

NY T-17 made available on May 21, 22, 1963, information reflecting that the name and address of JOHN HENRIK CLARKE, Post Office Box 55, College Station, New York, N. Y., was known to the FPCC.

The "New York Post" newspaper of April 25, 1961, page 80, contains an advertisement of the FPCC, 799 Broadway, New York City, captioned "Cuba, A Declaration of Conscience by Afro-Americans". This advertisement states that "We Afro-Americans" have the right and duty to protest against the threatened aggression against Cuba by white Cuban politicians trained and financed by the Central Intelligence Agency in Miami, Florida.

Among the names appearing on this advertisement is that of JOHN HENRIK CLARKE.

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NY T-18 advised on December 3, 1962, that on December 1, 1962, a party to raise funds for "Freedomways" was held at the residence of WILLIAM PATTERSON, 1268 President Street, Brooklyn, N. Y. JOHN CLARKE of "Freedomways" was among those present.

NY T-18 advised on April 17, 1963, that on the afternoon of April 7, 1963, a reception honoring Captain HUGH MULZAC on the publication of his book, "A Star to Steer By" was held at the YMCA, 361 West 125th Street, New York City. JOHN H. CLARKE was among those who attended. NY T-18 also advised that JAMES and ESTHER JACKSON and WILLIAM L. PATTERSON were included among those in attendance.

NY T-19 advised on November 10, 1954, that HUGH MULZAC was a CP member of long standing in the Jamaica, Long Island section of the CP and that at that time MULZAC was a CP member or sympathizer.

E. MISCELLANEOUS

On the following dates, NY T-1 made available information reflecting that CLARKE was engaged in activities on behalf of "Freedomways" magazine, such as soliciting articles from individuals, placing the publications in book stores in this country and abroad, increasing the subscriptions in this country and abroad and raising funds to meet added expenses:

February 11, May 20, June 24, July 15, August 26, October 21, November 18 and December 9, 1962 and February 17, March 17, May 12 and June 9, 1963.

On April 1, 1962, NY T-1 made available information reflecting that CLARKE contacted JULIAN MAYFIELD in Accra, Ghana, stating that MAYFIELD was being appointed their scout in Ghana to insure that they receive adequate contributions from Ghana for a special issue of the magazine they were preparing on Africa.

On March 17, 1963, NY T-1 made available information reflecting that in March, 1963, CLARKE was in contact with JULIAN MAYFIELD in Accra, Ghana, with respect to papers

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which MAYFIELD had forwarded to CLARKE, as well as an article and a book review which MAYFIELD was to do.

The "Daily Worker", an east coast daily Communist newspaper which suspended publication on January 13, 1958, in its issue of August 2, 1951, page 7, column 3, reflects that JULIAN MAYFIELD was then Chairman of the Subcommittee on Unemployment of the Committee for the Negro in the Arts, 261 West 125th Street, New York, N. Y.

The Committee for the Negro in the Arts has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

NY T-20 advised on September 20, 1955, that he received information that three leaders of the Partido Comunista Puertorriqueno (PCP) (Communist Party of Puerto Rico) had visited in Naranjito, Puerto Rico, prior to the date the information was furnished, where they talked to the wife of JULIAN MAYFIELD. During the discussion between the three leaders and ANA LIVIA CORDERO, MAYFIELD's wife, JULIAN MAYFIELD was mentioned as a potential recruit for a new PCP club in Naranjito, Puerto Rico, which was to be formed subsequent to that date.

NY T-21 advised on a date prior to August, 1955, that the PCP was a CP in its own right and not a district organization of the CP, USA, although it is based on the same Marxist - Leninist principles as the CP, USA.

NY T-8 advised on April 29, 1961, that JULIAN MAYFIELD was in attendance at the first anniversary banquet of the FPCC, where he was introduced as the co-author of an FPCC advertisement which appeared in the April 21, 1961 edition of the "New York Times".

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On September 23, 1962, NY T-1 made available information reflecting that CLARKE was contacted in July, 1962, by one ELLIS BOWLES, the agent for "The African Communist" in London, England, which is described as a quarterly journal of the South African CP. BOWLES advised CLARKE that he was considering ways of bringing the attention of African writers and other readers in London to the fact that the next edition of "Freedomways" would be devoted to the new image of Africa, which information CLARKE had supplied to him. BOWLES suggested that CLARKE consider inserting an advertisement in "The African Communist" on the availability of "Freedomways".

On January 13, 1963, NY T-1 made available information reflecting that CLARKE had contacted [redacted] of "The West Indian Gazette", London, England, thanking him for a press release of "Freedomways" in the Gazette. CLARKE inquired if [redacted] could advise him as to how the "Freedomways" issue on Africa was being received by Africans in London. At the same time, he requested [redacted] to extend their greetings to CLAUDIA.

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On December 9, 1962, NY T-1 made available information reflecting that in November of 1962, CLARKE had contacted [redacted] of "The West Indian Gazette", expressing appreciation for the attention which [redacted] had given to a press release of "Freedomways" relating to the Fall, 1962, issue, which dealt with Africa.

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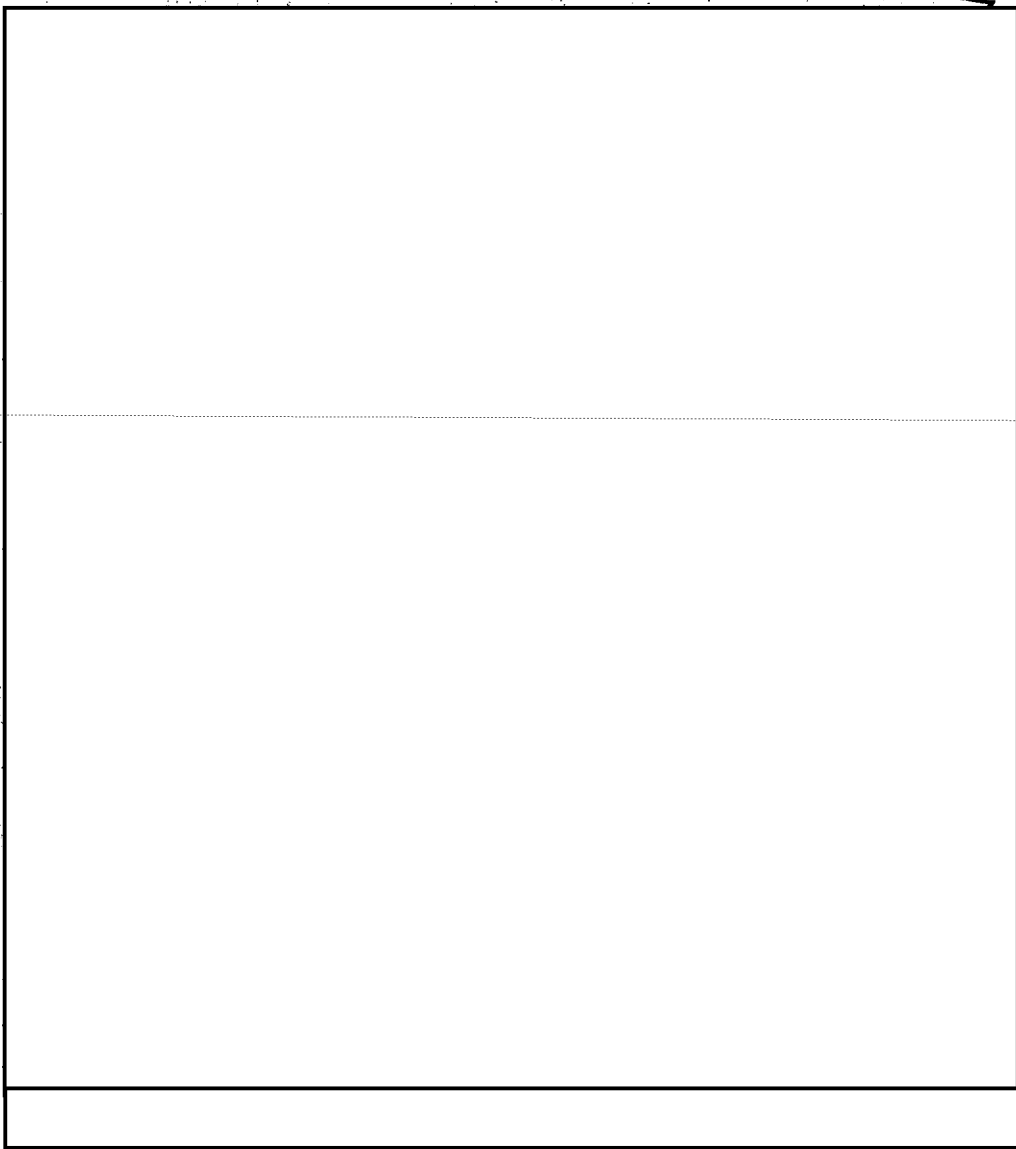
On January 30, 1963, NY T-22, a confidential source [redacted] furnished the following information concerning [redacted]

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NY T-1 advised on January 13, 1963, that during January of 1963, CLARKE was in contact with [redacted]

[redacted] expressing interest in reviewing books on the Seven Seas list that relate to people of Africa and African descent. He requested that [redacted] extend their best regards to [redacted] whom they hoped would be able to contribute to the Summer, 1963, issue of "Freedomways".

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"Director of the African Institute of the USSR Academy of Sciences, was here a few weeks ago and we spent a most rewarding evening together".

NY T-24 advised on June 20, 1950, that he knew ALPHAEUS HUNTON as a concealed CP member as of late 1945.

NY T-28 advised on December 7, 1955, that ALPHAEUS HUNTON was a CP member in Washington, D. C., from 1937 to 1940, at which time contact with him was terminated. NY T-28 stated that HUNTON, during the period 1937 - 1940, was active in the National Negro Congress (NNC) in Washington, D. C.

The NNC has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

W. ALPHAEUS HUNTON is listed by "Freedomways" magazine in all its issues as an Associate Editor

NY T-18 advised on June 12, 1963, that he knows CLARKE as an Associate Editor of "Freedomways" magazine, but does not know of any CP membership or activity on the part of CLARKE.

NY T-6 advised on June 10, 1963, that he does not know of any CP membership or activity on the part of CLARKE.

NY T-29 advised on June 3, 1963, that he could furnish no information concerning any current activities on the part of CLARKE.

NY T-14 advised on July 15, 1963 that neither CLARKE nor his wife are believed to be members of the CP. The reason for this belief is that, prior to the meeting of the Freedomways Forum at CLARKE's apartment, ESTHER JACKSON advised a CP member that caution would have to be exercised in speaking in the presence of the CLARKEs, since "they are not one of us". NY T-14 believes that this meant that the CLARKEs were not CP members.

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NY T-14 added that it is known that the CLARKEs are considered to be extremely progressive and also very anxious for the Negro movement to succeed.

A characterization of the Nation of Islam, the organization of the Black Muslims, is set forth in the appendix pages of this report.

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1. APPENDIX

"PROGRESSIVE LABOR"

A source advised on January 10, 1962, that on November 27, 1961, General Post Office Box 808, Brooklyn 1, New York, was rented under the name Progressive Labor by MILTON ROSEN, who listed the character of business as "Magazine." MILTON ROSEN'S business and residence was 90 Sterling Street, Brooklyn, New York.

Records of the New York County Clerk's Office, New York, New York, reflect that on February 16, 1962, MILTON K. ROSEN, 90 Sterling Street, Brooklyn, New York, filed a Business Certificate which stated that he was doing business under the name Progressive Labor Co. at 799 Broadway, New York. Volume 1, number 1, January, 1962, issue of "Progressive Labor" indicates that it is published monthly, with its address General Post Office Box 808, Brooklyn 1, New York. Its editors were listed as MILTON ROSEN and MORT SCHEER.

Volume 1, Number 3, March, 1962, issue of "Progressive Labor" indicates that it is published monthly by the Progressive Labor Co., with offices at 799 Broadway, New York, New York.

ETHEL KLEIN NEWTON, a member of the Communist Party (CP) from 1946 to 1949, and from September, 1955, until September, 1962, on January 18, 1962, made available an undated letter on the letterhead of Progressive Labor, which introduced the new magazine. This letter stated that the main purpose of this magazine is to help develop an alternative policy for the labor movement and stated in part ". . . the fundamental solution to the problems of the American people will be in a socialist America, a society in which the people will own the means of production . . ."

"The Worker" an East coast Communist newspaper, issue of January 7, 1962, page 10, column 3, under the caption "MILTON ROSEN Expelled by CP" reported an announcement by the Communist Party of New York State of the expulsion of MILTON ROSEN and MORTIMER SCHEER from the Communist Party for disruptive activities, which stated in part ". . . together they are issuing a scurrilous anti-labor and anti-party sheet mis-named Progressive Labor, as the organ of this group. . ."

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APPENDIX

"PROGRESSIVE LABOR" (CONT'D)

A second source advised on January 22, 1962, that MILTON ROSEN was concerned about the future of the magazine and indicated there was not enough money available to publish the next issue.

A third source on March 13, 1962, advised that there are indications that "Progressive Labor" will continue as a publication, but that it is too early to make a prediction.

A fourth source on March 5, 1962, advised that the supporters of "Progressive Labor" expect that it will continue to be published and that it will be a force in the labor movement.

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APPENDIX

"NATIONAL GUARDIAN"

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning the "National Guardian":

"National Guardian

- "1. 'established by the American Labor Party in 1947 as a "progressive" weekly * * *. Although it denies having any affiliation with the Communist Party, it has manifested itself from the beginning as a virtual official propaganda arm of Soviet Russia.' (Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, Trial by Treason: The National Committee to Secure Justice for the ROSENBERGS and MORTON SOBELL, August 25, 1956, p. 12.)"

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APPENDIX

COMMITTEE TO SECURE JUSTICE
FOR MORTON SOBELL

"Following the execution of atomic spies ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG in June, 1953, the 'Communist campaign assumed a different emphasis. Its major effort centered upon MORTON SOBELL, 'the ROSENBERGS' codefendant. The National Committee to Secure Justice in the Rosenberg Case - a Communist front which had been conducting the campaign in the United States - was reconstituted as the National Rosenberg-Sobell Committee at a conference in Chicago in October, 1953, and 'then as the National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in the Rosenberg Case'"

("Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" dated December 1, 1961, issued by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, page 116.)

In September, 1954, the name "National Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" appeared on literature issued by the Committee. In March, 1955, the current name, "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell," first appeared on literature issued by the Committee.

The Address Telephone Directory for the Borough of Manhattan, New York City, as published by the New York Telephone Company, on April 16, 1963, lists the "Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell" (CSJMS) as being located at 940 Broadway, New York, New York.

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APPENDIX

METROPOLITAN RECREATION ASSOCIATION
Formerly known as Nature Friends of
America, Inc., Operator of Camp Midvale

Nature Friends of America, Inc. (NFA) has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The records of the New York County Clerk's Office, Supreme Court Building, New York City, reflect that a certificate of dissolution for NFA was filed with the Secretary of State, State of New York, on February 23, 1954.

A source advised on March 12, 1954, that at a meeting of the former New York Local of NFA held on February 25, 1954, in New York City, a successor organization known as the Metropolitan Recreation Association (MRA) was set up and all assets and real property formerly belonging to the New York Local of NFA were transferred to the MRA.

On November 4, 1957, a second source made available a copy of the constitution of the MRA, which was adopted in 1957, and which, under Article II, set forth the aims of the organization as follows:

"The purpose of the association is to bring together people without regard to race, color, national origin, religion, or beliefs, having a common interest in outdoor sports, recreational and cultural activities, and the fullest use of leisure time for the furtherance of the welfare and well-being of the members; to encourage the study of nature and of the natural sciences, and of the modes of living and customs and cultures of the people of the United States, past and present. . . ."

On March 26, 1954, a third source made available a copy of the March, 1954, issue of the "Camp Midvale News," official organ of Camp Midvale, Midvale, New Jersey, which, on page 1, states that the recently formed MRA is the organization which owns and operates Camp Midvale.

The MRA, as of May 15, 1963, continues to utilize General Post Office Box 634, New York City, as its mailing address.

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APPENDIX

FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE

The April 6, 1960, edition of "The New York Times" newspaper contains a full-page advertisement captioned "What Is Really Happening In Cuba," placed by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC). This advertisement announced the formation of the FPCC in New York City and declared the FPCC intended to promulgate "the truth about revolutionary Cuba" to neutralize the distorted American press.

"The New York Times" edition of January 11, 1961, reported that at a hearing conducted before the United States Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on January 10, 1961, Dr. CHARLES A. SANTOS-BUCH identified himself and ROBERT TABER as organizers of the FPCC. He also testified he and TABER obtained funds from the Cuban Government which were applied toward the cost of the afore-mentioned advertisement.

On May 16, 1963, a source advised that during the first two years of the FPCC's existence there was a struggle between Communist Party (CP) and Socialist Workers Party (SWP) elements to exert their power within the FPCC and thereby influence FPCC policy. However, during the past year this source observed there has been a successful effort by FPCC leadership to minimize the role of these and other organizations in the FPCC so that today their influence is negligible.

On May 20, 1963, a second source advised that the National Headquarters of the FPCC is located in Room 329 at 799 Broadway, New York City. According to this source, the position of National Office Director was created in the fall of 1962 and was filled by VINCENT "TED" LEE, who now formulates FPCC policy. This source observed LEE has followed a course of entertaining and accepting the cooperation of many other organizations including the CP and the SWP when he has felt it would be to his personal benefit as well as the FPCC's. However, LEE has indicated to this source he has no intention of permitting FPCC policy to be determined by any other organization. LEE feels the FPCC should advocate resumption of diplomatic relations between Cuba and the United States and support the right of Cubans to manage their revolution without interference from other nations, but not support the Cuban revolution per se.

The CP and the SWP have been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

I.APPENDIXNATION OF ISLAM

In January, 1957, a source advised ELIJAH MUHAMMAD has described his organization on a nationwide basis as the "Nation of Islam" and "Muhammad's Temples of Islam."

On May 2, 1962, a second source advised: "ELIJAH MUHAMMAD is the national leader of the Nation of Islam (NOI). Muhammad's Temple of Islam Number 2, 5335 South Greenwood Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, is the national headquarters of the NOI. In mid-1960, MUHAMMAD and other NOI officials, when referring to MUHAMMAD'S organization on a nationwide basis, commenced using either "Mosque" or "Temple" when mentioning one of "Muhammad's Temples of Islam."

The NOI is an all-Negro organization which was originally organized in 1930 in Detroit, Michigan. MUHAMMAD claims to have been selected by Allah, the Supreme Being, to lead the so-called Negro race out of "slavery in the wilderness of North America by establishing an independent black nation in the United States. Members following MUHAMMAD'S teaching and his interpretation of the "Koran" believe there is no such thing as a Negro; that the so-called Negroes are slaves of the white race, referred to as "white devils," in the United States; and that the white race, because of its exploitation of the so-called Negroes, must and will be destroyed in the approaching "War of Armageddon."

In the past, officials and members of the NOI, including MUHAMMAD, have refused to register under the provisions of the Selective Service Acts and have declared that members owe no allegiance to the United States.

On May 5, 1958, the first source advised MUHAMMAD had, upon advice of legal counsel, tempered his personal statements and instructions to his ministers concerning the principles of his organization in order to avoid possible prosecution by the United States Government; however, he did not indicate any fundamental changes in the teachings of his organization.

On May 2, 1962, a third source advised MUHAMMAD had, early in July, 1958, decided to de-emphasize the religious aspects of the teachings of Islam and to stress the economic benefits to be derived by those Negroes who joined the NOI. This policy change, according to MUHAMMAD, would help him acquire additional followers and create more interest in his programs.

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Dr. SINED (ph) told CLARKE that he had received a letter from HARYOU - ACT to whom CLARKE had given his name as a reference. He asked if CLARKE wanted him to stress any particular thing. CLARKE replied that he wanted him to say only that he, CLARKE, is qualified to teach the subject which he has been assigned, African history.

Dr. SINED (ph) referred to the "stupidness that is going on in Mobilization for Youth" (MFY) and asked if there would be any repercussions in the HARYOU program because of the red-baiting which was going on. CLARKE said he did not know but did not think they could fight it. CLARKE mentioned that they had "a little red-baiter" at HARYOU who came from MFY, who was the "chief spotter" at MFY. CLARKE added that he supposed that this person is wondering why he, CLARKE, was getting such a big job without a college degree as well as where CLARKE came from.

It is believed that the person in contact with CLARKE was Dr. CALVIN H. SINNETTE who is one of the three persons listed as owning stock in the corporation, Freedomways Associates, Inc., which publishes the magazine, "Freedomways".

The above information is being reported administratively because of the inability of the informant to identify clearly the person with whom CLARKE was in contact.

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[redacted] are known to have had some contact with MALCOLM LITTLE and his Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU) and also may have been part of the "brain trust" which met with MALCOLM and helped him set up the OAAU. He stated that they may have taken out membership cards in the OAAU but that it is not known that they are active in it. CLARKE's name was one of those listed.

This information is reported administratively because the information is non-specific.

CLARKE's continuing interest in Negro history and the connection of Negroes with African Heritage is indicated by a magazine [redacted] on 9/18/61, entitled "African Heritage" and dated December,

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1959. This magazine contains a photograph of JOHN H. CLARKE, showing him as the Research Director of the African Heritage Exposition held in NYC during the period 8/6 - 15/59. This magazine contains photographs and drawings of African scenes as well as five small articles by CLARKE.

CLARKE is being recommended for inclusion on the Security Index of the NYO because of his major activity in the running of the magazine, "Freedomways", plus his connection with HERBERT APTHEKER in the American Institute for Marxist Studies.

CLARKE resides at 2186 Fifth Avenue, NYC. ✓ He is employed as an Associate Editor of "Freedomways" magazine ✓ and expends considerable effort in this position such as contributing articles, fund raising, and attempting to increase its circulation here and abroad. ✓ He also teaches African History at HARYOU - ACT, which is attempting to combat juvenile delinquency in Harlem. ✓ CLARKE attended the founding meeting of the American Institute for Marxist Studies ✓ and is an "associate" of that organization. ✓ He was listed as one of the scheduled instructors for the Fall, 1963, term of the NY School for Marxist Studies. ✓ He and ESTHER JACKSON, Managing Editor of "Freedomways", were active in forming the Harlem Freedomways Forum, took part in its activities, but have now decided they cannot afford to be associated with that group. ✓ CLARKE and

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HERBERT APTHEKER were the principal speakers at a memorial tribute for W.E.B. DU BOIS, held on November 27, 1963, under the auspices of the NY School for Marxist Studies. CLARKE also spoke at an open meeting of the Allerton Forum on January 21, 1964, which was reportedly sponsored by a CP club. He has contracted with the Seven Seas Publishers in Germany for the publication of a book, "Harlem: USA", which contains material from the Summer, 1963, issue of "Freedomways". He is credited in the book as editing the contents. The book is on sale in the US at the Jefferson Book Shop. In 1959, he participated in a conference of Negro writers in NYC. He has been in contact with JULIAN MAYFIELD in Ghana, assisted in the preparation of a radio documentary on W.E.B. DU BOIS, and has had business dealings with the "National Guardian", WILLIAM WEINSTONE, a Paris magazine, BETTY GANNETT, RICHARD B. MOORE, [redacted] and with FELIX CUMMINGS of the British Guiana Public Relations and Information Office in NYC. CLARKE and ESTHER JACKSON were to meet with the Attache of the Hungarian Legation in April, 1964. [redacted] was one of those whom MALCOLM LITTLE indicated had been assigned to go over ideas for a new organization.]

A. RESIDENCE

NY T-1 advised on August 6, 1964, that on that date JOHN CLARKE stated that he was residing at 2186 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

The current Manhattan Telephone Directory lists CLARKE as the subscriber to telephone number FO 8-2771, at the above address.

On November 10, 1964, CLARKE's name was observed in the directory of the apartment building at 2186 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

B. EMPLOYMENT

The Summer, 1964, issue of "Freedomways", which is self-described as a quarterly magazine published by Freedomways Associates, Incorporated (FA Inc.) at 799 Broadway, New York City, lists JOHN HENRIK CLARKE as an Associate Editor. His name has appeared as an Associate Editor in each issue of the magazine since the Spring, 1962, issue.

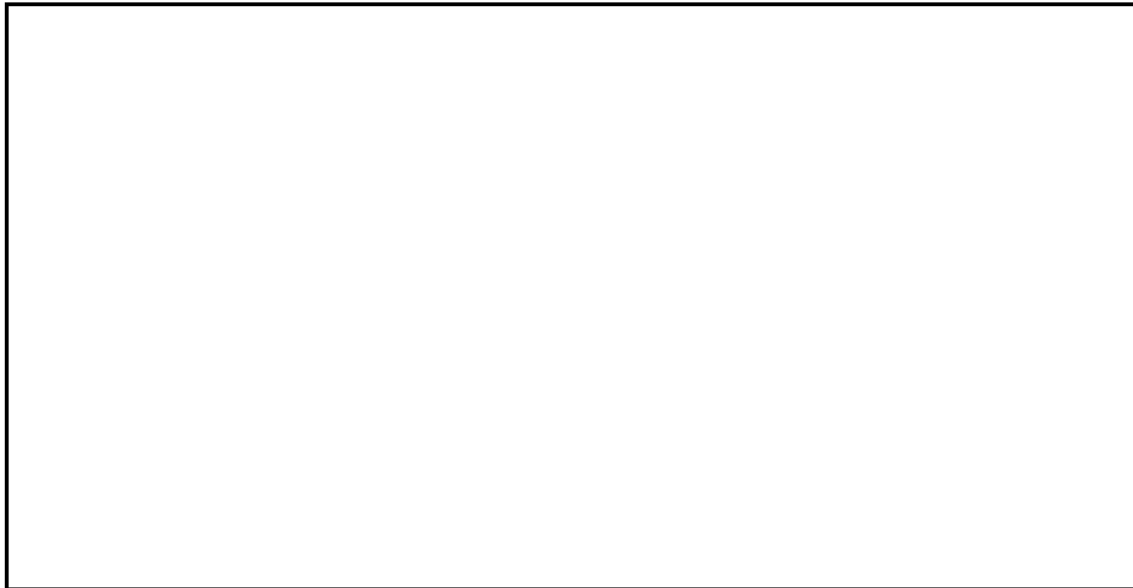
A characterization of FA Inc. is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

NY T-2 furnished information on October 18, 1964, reflecting that CLARKE is now drawing a weekly salary of \$65.20 from FA Inc.

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The Summer, 1963, issue of "Freedomways" was a special issue devoted to "Harlem, A Community in Transition". CLARKE contributed a short story to this issue, "Revolt of the Angels", as well as a book review. The section of the magazine devoted to sketches on the contributors notes that "John H. Clarke, Associate Editor of 'Freedomways', conceived and planned the idea for this special issue devoted to Harlem...."

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CLARKE contributed book reviews to the Fall, 1963, and Spring, 1964, issues of the magazine and also helped compile a section of the magazine on "Recent Books". He contributed a short story, "Return to the Inn", to the Summer, 1964, issue as well as two book reviews.

NY T-2 furnished information on October 27, 1963, reflecting that in September, 1963, CLARKE stated that he hoped to undertake fund-raising procedures for "Freedomways", such as establishing "Friends of Freedomways" groups in major cities whose purpose would be to solicit subscriptions to the magazine. He said that he and ESTHER JACKSON would be available to speak to any groups in the Chicago area who were interested in contributing to this effort.

ESTHER JACKSON

The Summer, 1964, issue of "Freedomways" lists ESTHER JACKSON as its Managing Editor.

ESTHER JACKSON is the wife of JAMES JACKSON whom NY T-4, on January 13, 1964, described as a member of the National Committee of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA).

NY T-5 advised on September 20, 1963, that the Amistad Society of Chicago presented a panel discussion on the subject, "The Black Writer in an Era of Struggle", on August 23, 1963, at the Liberty Baptist Church, 4849 South Park, Chicago. A program for the affair listed JOHN H. CLARKE as one of the panelists. NY T-5 said that it was learned that CLARKE spoke on the value of the quarterly publication, "Freedomways".

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The August 30, 1963, issue of "Muhammad Speaks", page 9, contains an article advertising the Amistad Society affair featuring JOHN H. CLARKE and others. This article describes the Amistad Society as a Chicago organization devoted to historical research and study of achievements and gifts of people of African descent in the United States and throughout the world.

"Muhammad Speaks" is the publication of the Nation of Islam, a characterization of which is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

NY T-5 advised on September 20, 1963, that on August 22, 1963, a meeting of the African - American Heritage Association (AAHA) was held at AAHA Headquarters, 306 East 43rd Street, Chicago, Illinois, which was advertised as the Du Sable Week Celebration. NY T-5 stated that among those who attended was JOHN CLARKE, the Associate Editor of "Freedomways", who promoted the sale of this publication, stating that the articles were of great importance to an insight on the Negro. CLARKE urged everyone to get a copy of the Centennial Edition of "Freedomways" and his speech centered around the role of the author in the freedom movement. The source also furnished a flyer which was an invitation to the Du Sable Week Celebration "in commemoration of Chicago's first settler" to be held during the period of August 18 - 24, 1963. It stated that the AAHA would present noted Afro-American writers on August 22, 1963, at AAHA Headquarters, one of whom would be CLARKE. The flyer also contained the comment "Introducing and Reemphasizing the Quarterly 'Freedomways'".

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A characterization of the AAHA is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

On the following dates, NY T-2 made available information showing that CLARKE was engaged in activities on behalf of "Freedomways" magazine such as soliciting articles, establishing collaboration and exchange relationships with foreign publications, sending copies to foreign contacts to acquaint them with the magazine, attempting to increase circulation in this country and abroad:

January 12, 1964
April 5, 1964
June 14, 1964
October 18, 1964

NY T-1 advised on July 9, 1964, that, on that date, CLARKE commented that he had just received an appointment to act as Heritage Director at HARYOU. He described it as the first decent salary he had had in ten years and that he puts in twenty hours a week there in addition to his time at "Freedomways".

On August 18, 1964, NY T-1 advised that, on that date, CLARKE stated that he is teaching African History at HARYOU - ACT.

"The New York Times", October 28, 1964, page 46, column 1, described HARYOU - ACT as a Harlem Youth project formed by the merging of two organizations, Harlem Youth Opportunities Unlimited and Associated Community Teams. It said that the Harlem project is an attempt to improve the status of underprivileged youths.

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NY T-6 advised on September 1, 1964, that, on that date, an employee of "Freedomways" stated that CLARKE had been broadcasting to everyone that he is the Director of the African Heritage Committee for the HARYOU - ACT project.

C. ACTIVITIES INDICATING CP AFFILIATION.

NY T-2 furnished information on January 12, 1964, reflecting that in December, 1963, HERBERT APTHEKER invited CLARKE to attend the provisional organizing meeting of the American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS) on December 19, 1963, and that CLARKE accepted.

HERBERT APTHEKER

NY T-7 advised in December, 1959, that HERBERT APTHEKER was elected to the National Committee of the CP, USA at its 17th National Convention held in December, 1959.

NY T-8 advised on October 26, 1964, that, as of October, 1964, HERBERT APTHEKER was the National Director of AIMS.

A characterization of AIMS is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

NY T-9 made available information on July 1, 1964, reflecting the identities of those who attended the first and founding meeting of AIMS, which was held on December 19, 1963, and which was continued on January 10, 1964. JOHN HENRIK CLARKE was one of those present, and at the session of December 19, 1963, the bylaws for AIMS were adopted.

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NY T-2 furnished information on April 5, 1964, reflecting that on February 6, 1964, CLARKE advised HERBERT APTHEKER that he had considered carefully the matter relating to an executive assignment but did not think it advisable for him at the current time. CLARKE felt that they would be working together on several projects for the next two or three years and appreciated APTHEKER's offer to help on several projects.

NY T-10 advised on April 28, 1964, that the first symposium sponsored by AIMS was held in the Sheraton - Atlantic Hotel in New York City on April 23, 1964, and that JOHN CLARKE was present.

NY T-2 made available on June 14, 1964, information reflecting that in May, 1964, CLARKE advised APTHEKER that with respect to the plans for the annual meeting of AIMS he, CLARKE, had no particular preference as to the time of the meeting and would be in New York City during the entire month of October, 1964.

NY T-9 made available information on August 14, 1964, reflecting that JOHN HENRIK CLARKE of "Freedomways" magazine is an "Associate" of AIMS.

On September 8, 1963, NY T-11 made available a copy of the Fall Term, 1963, Bulletin of the New York School for Marxist Studies (NYSMS). Listed among the scheduled instructors for the Fall Term, scheduled to run from October 11, 1963 through November 25, 1963, is JOHN HENRIK CLARKE.

A characterization of the NYSMS is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

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NY T-12 advised on December 27, 1963, that, according to [redacted] a member of the 11th Assembly District Club of the Harlem Region CP and a member of the County Committee CP of New York, a special meeting was to be called on January 19, 1964, to formulate plans for a Freedomways Forum meeting. Serving on the committee would be [redacted] another member of the 11th Assembly District CP Club and JOHN H. CLARKE of "Freedomways" magazine.

A characterization of Freedomways Forum, under the heading, Harlem Freedomways Forum, is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

On January 12, 1964, NY T-2 made available a copy of a form letter on the stationery of "Freedomways" which was addressed to the readers of that magazine. It stated that "a number of 'Freedomways' readers in the Harlem community had suggested to us that the time is ripe to organize some kind of community Forum under 'Freedomways' auspices" and that undoubtedly the readers would have some opinions on the matter. The letter invites the recipient to attend the discussion on the proposals for the forum which would be held on January 19, 1964, at 144 West 138th Street, New York City. The letter was signed by CLARKE as Associate Editor and by ESTHER JACKSON as Managing Editor.

NY T-1 advised on January 15, 1964, that, on that date, CLARKE stated that the Freedomways Forum was going to be one of ideas to publicize the magazine and to associate it with dynamic ideas developing in the community. He added that it would be held on January 19, 1964, at the Adam Clayton Powell Center.

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NY T-13 advised on February 5, 1964, that on January 19, 1964, the Harlem Freedomways Forum held a meeting at the Adam Clayton Powell Center, New York City, and that JOHN CLARKE of "Freedomways" gave the main report. According to NY T-13, CLARKE raised the point of what people really want in the way of a forum. He recalled that past forums helped to develop Negro youth become future leaders of the community. CLARKE brought out that the purpose of the meeting was to find out what kind of forum the people wanted. He spoke of other forums and suggested topics for discussion.

On January 20, 1964, NY T-14 furnished similar information about the January 19, 1964, meeting.

On March 5, 1964, NY T-13 advised that there was held an Executive Committee meeting of the Harlem Freedomways Forum in New York City on February 27, 1964. JOHN CLARKE was present for part of the meeting, the purpose of which was to make final arrangements for a membership meeting on March 1, 1964.

NY T-13 advised on March 5, 1964, that the membership meeting of the Harlem Freedomways Forum was held on March 1, 1964, at which ESTHER JACKSON spoke first on the subject of "Freedomways". She said that the forum would complement the work of Freedomways Associates. NY T-13 stated that JOHN CLARKE was present at this meeting.

On March 2, 1964, NY T-14 furnished similar information about the March 1, 1964, meeting.

NY T-13 advised on July 27, 1964, that, on July 12, 1964, a forum was held at 340 East 106th Street, by the Harlem Freedomways Forum where the subject of high school drop outs and education was discussed. JOHN CLARKE made the summation at the end of the discussion period.

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NY T-14 advised on August 25, 1964, that an Executive Committee meeting of the Harlem Freedomways Forum was held at Bermuda Hall, New York City, on August 21, 1964. LILLIAN MARTINEZ acted as Chairman of the meeting and indicated that it was necessary to arrange for a meeting which she and [redacted] would attend, the purpose of which would be to discuss the Harlem Freedomways Forum, especially as to whether the forum should pull away from Freedomways Associates.

LILLIAN MARTINEZ

NY T-14 advised on August 25, 1964, that LILLIAN MARTINEZ is a member of the 11th Assembly District CP Club.

NY T-13 advised on September 18, 1964, that a Harlem Freedomways Forum committee meeting at the office of "Freedomways" magazine was held on September 14, 1964. NY T-13 said that ESTHER JACKSON informed the committee that after discussion with JOHN CLARKE she felt that the association between the forum and the magazine was not in the best interests of the magazine. She said that the magazine is a prestige publication and that the forum has not proven to be a successfully managed community organization. NY T-13 said that the forum will now be called the Harlem Freedom Forum.

On September 16, 1964, NY T-14 furnished similar information concerning the meeting at the office of "Freedomways" on September 14, 1964. In addition, JACKSON said that it was the opinion of herself and JOHN CLARKE that, at this time, they at "Freedomways" could not afford to be affiliated with the Harlem Freedomways Forum.

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"The Worker", in its issue of November 5, 1963, page 6, column 1, contains an announcement of a memorial tribute to Dr. W.E.B. DU BOIS to be held on the night of November 27, 1963, at Academy Hall, New York City, under the auspices of the NYSMS. It states that the speakers would be JOHN HENRIK CLARKE and HERBERT APTHEKER.

"The Worker" is an East Coast Communist newspaper.

"The New York Times", August 28, 1963, page 3, contains an article datelined at Accra, Ghana, stating that W.E.B. DU BOIS died on August 28, 1963. It states that he went to Ghana as the guest of President KWAME NKRUMAH to become Director of the Encyclopedia Africana, which was sponsored by the Government of Ghana and became a citizen of that country. The article also states that "During his later years, he was active in many left-wing and Communist activities. In the Fall of 1961, at the age of 93, he joined the Communist Party."

NY T-15 advised on December 2, 1963, that, on the night of November 27, 1963, a memorial tribute in honor of W.E.B. DU BOIS was held in Academy Hall, New York City, under the auspices of the NYSMS. At this affair, the principal speakers were JOHN HENRIK CLARKE and HERBERT APTHEKER. CLARKE was the first speaker, and he spoke for about 25 minutes on the interest of DU BOIS in Africa and on the history of the Negro race.

Substantially the same information concerning the above meeting was furnished by the following sources on the dates indicated:

NY T-17 advised on February 5, 1964, that, on January 19, 1964, HYMAN GOLDSTEIN stated that his CP club was sponsoring a meeting to be held on Tuesday evening, January 21, 1964, at the Allerton Center for JOHN CLARKE, Associate Editor of "Freedomways".

HYMAN GOLDSTEIN

NY T-17 reported on various dates between August 22, 1963, and July 15, 1964, that HYMAN GOLDSTEIN had admitted he was a member of the CP, Bronx, New York, as of those periods. NY T-17 said that GOLDSTEIN admitted his CP membership as of July, 1964.

✓ "The Worker", issue of January 14, 1964, contained an announcement that JOHN H. CLARKE, Associate Editor of "Freedomways", and a lecturer and teacher, would speak on "The African Freedom and Liberation Movement" on January 21, 1964, under the auspices of the Allerton Avenue Forum, 683 Allerton Avenue, Bronx, New York.

A similar announcement appeared in the "National Guardian", January 16, 1964, page 11, column 2.

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A characterization of the "National Guardian" is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

NY T-22 advised on January 24, 1964, that the Allerton Forum held an open meeting on January 21, 1964, at the Allerton Center, Bronx, New York, to hear a lecture by JOHN CLARKE. CLARKE was introduced by BELLA HALEBSKY as a teacher and lecturer on African affairs. CLARKE spoke on African history, dating back to the 13th century. He was not received very enthusiastically. He asked for no fee for the lecture but for subscriptions to the magazine, "Freedomways".

BELLA HALEBSKY

NY T-23 advised on September 4, 1964, that, on August 19, 1964, the Bronx County CP held a county meeting at the Bronx Cultural Club, 868 East 180th Street, Bronx, New York, and that BELLA HALEBSKY was in attendance.

The following sources furnished similar information concerning the meeting at the Allerton Center on January 21, 1964, on the dates indicated:

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NY T-2 furnished information on January 12, 1964, reflecting that in November, 1963, ESTHER JACKSON, as Managing Editor of "Freedomways", advised Miss GERTRUDE GELBIN, Chief Editor of Seven Seas Publishers, that she was confirming the fact that CLARKE had been given permission to use the contents of the Summer, 1963, issue of "Freedomways" and other material copyrighted by the magazine in the anthology, "Harlem: USA". She said this permission was granted provided that "Freedomways" is reimbursed for the authors' fees which were paid for the material and that the anthology contain a preface note to the effect that the material was being used with the permission of "Freedomways" and that the main body of material was taken from the Summer, 1963, issue.

On October 18, 1964, NY T-2 made available a throwaway announcing that Seven Seas Books "The Paperbacks in the English Language Published in the German Democratic Republic" was presenting a new book, "Harlem: USA", which was edited by and contains an introduction from JOHN HENRIK CLARKE. It states that it is a book for all who want to know about the Negro today in the United States. It also states that the book can be ordered now from the Jefferson Book Shop, 100 East 16th Street, New York City.

A characterization of the Jefferson Book Shop, Incorporated is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

D. MISCELLANEOUS

NY T-32, on September 18, 1961, made available a pamphlet entitled "The American Negro Writer and his Roots", which was published by the American Society of African Culture in 1960 in New York City. This pamphlet contains selected papers from the First Conference of Negro Writers held in New York City during the period February 28, 1959, to March 1, 1959. It also contains photographs of the "Conference Planning Committee". Included on this committee were JOHN O. KILLENS, the Chairman, JOHN HENRIK CLARKE, JULIAN MAYFIELD and SARA E. WRIGHT, among others.

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It notes that the Conference was sponsored by the American Society of African Culture and that the Negro writers "discussed the materials used by Negro writers, social responsibility and protest writing, marketing problems and opportunities for the development of Negro writers."

This pamphlet contains an article by CLARKE entitled "Reclaiming the Lost African Heritage". In this article, CLARKE states that he is not of the school that believes that people of African descent in the Western world have no African heritage to reclaim. He adds that the image of Africa was distorted by imperialists as being a savage and backward land because they sought to justify their destruction of African cultural patterns and ways of life. He notes that scholars have pointed to an African heritage which he feels must be reclaimed in order to reconcile American Negroes in general and Negro writers in particular with their roots.

JOHN O. KILLENS

On February 26, 1962, JOHN O. KILLENS was interviewed under oath by R. F. RYAN, a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, at which time KILLENS said he had been a member of the Washington Committee for Democratic Action, had been a delegate to a 1941 conference of the American Youth Congress, and had participated in activities of and made contributions to the National Negro Congress. He said he had never been an active member of this organization.

The Washington Committee for Democratic Action, the American Youth Congress, and the National Negro Congress have been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

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JULIAN MAYFIELD

The "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist newspaper, which ceased publication on January 13, 1958, in its issue of August 2, 1951, page 7, column 3, reflected that JULIAN MAYFIELD then was Chairman of the Subcommittee on Unemployment, Committee for the Negro in the Arts, 261 West 125th Street, New York, New York.

The Committee for the Negro in the Arts has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

NY T-33 advised on September 20, 1955, that he received information that three leaders of the Partido Comunista Puertorriqueno (PCP) (Communist Party of Puerto Rico) had visited in Naranjito, Puerto Rico, prior to the date the information was furnished, where they talked to the wife of JULIAN MAYFIELD. During the discussion between the three leaders and ANA LIVIA CORDERO, MAYFIELD's wife, JULIAN MAYFIELD was mentioned as a potential recruit for a new PCP club in Naranjito, Puerto Rico, which was to be formed subsequent to instant date.

NY T-34 advised on a date prior to August, 1955, that the PCP was a CP in its own right and not a district organization of the CP, USA, although it is based on the same Marxist - Leninist principles as the CP, USA.

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NY T-35 advised on April 29, 1961, that JULIAN MAYFIELD was in attendance at the First Anniversary Banquet of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC), where he was introduced from the floor as the co-author of an FPCC advertisement which appeared in the April 21, 1961 edition of "The New York Times."

A characterization of the FPCC is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

SARA WRIGHT

NY T-36 advised on September 4, 1963, that SARA WRIGHT, whose married name is KAYE, had been employed as Arts and Crafts Director at Camp Midvale, New Jersey, for about five weeks, June - July, 1963.

A characterization of Camp Midvale, under the caption, Metropolitan Recreation Association appears in the Appendix pages of this report.

NY T-37 advised on August 17, 1953, that SARA WRIGHT was a member of the CP, Eastern Pennsylvania and Delaware.

On September 10, 1963, Mr. JACK ZUCKER, President of the Eastern News Distributors, 255 Seventh Avenue, New York City, advised that he had been approached by JOHN CLARKE of "Freedomways" magazine to handle the distribution of "Freedomways". He said that he asked

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CLARKE if the magazine was strictly pushing for equal rights for Negroes or if it were pushing some kind of ideology. CLARKE told him that the magazine had no Communist connections and he, ZUCKER, agreed to handle its distribution.

Mr. ZUCKER added that after reading issues of the magazine, he got the feeling that it was getting to be anti-American. He said that he met other people connected with the magazine in addition to CLARKE and that they appeared to be educated Negro intellectuals. However, from talking to them and reading the magazine, he felt they "had an axe to grind" and that it was not "the American axe". He felt they were extremists with no love for the white man, that they were pro-Negro, pro-African and Anti-American. He said that he could not say they were pro-Communist but, personally, he would not trust them as far as this country is concerned. He said that because of his feeling about the magazine, he discontinued its distribution.

On January 12, 1964, NY T-2 made available information reflecting that CLARKE, in November, 1963, contacted JULIAN MAYFIELD, who could be reached in care of the Academy of Science in Accra, Ghana, West Africa. CLARKE commented on the assassination of President ~~KENNEDY~~, stating that most of their so-called leaders had made stupid statements about the President's death. He said the civil rights movement was at a standstill and should not be. He stated that they should "shed our tear", if they were sorry and "go on with the revolution". He added that the circle of people with which one could be honest is disappearing and that he was "openly questioning whether this country is worth living in."

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NY T-1 advised on January 9, 1964, that CLARKE had stated that he was disgusted with ESTHER JACKSON and [redacted] because he had done all the work gathering material for the All Southern issue of "Freedomways", but he was not allowed any say as to what material would appear. He mentioned that he had received a fine history of the Negro protest movement but that JACKSON and [redacted] would not print it because it talked of an attempted Communist take-over of the Negro movement. CLARKE complained that [redacted] was supposed to be handling promotion but was making editorial decisions.

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NY T-4 advised in July, 1962, that as of that period, [redacted] who is also known as [redacted] was considered by the CP, USA as being a member of its National Committee.

NY T-2 furnished information on January 12, 1964, reflecting that, on December 13, 1963, CLARKE revealed that he was assisting [redacted] the preparation of a documentary radio program on Dr. W.E.B. DU BOIS.

NY T-1 advised on January 17, 1964, that, on that date, CLARKE contacted the "National Guardian" concerning a pamphlet which a Paris, France, magazine, known as "Presence Africaine", wanted. He arranged to have the necessary copies sent to the magazine by the "National Guardian".

NY T-1 advised on January 21, 1964, that, on that date, CLARKE contacted WILLIAM WEINSTONE on a business matter.

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WILLIAM WEINSTONE

NY T-31 advised on January 22, 1961, that WILLIAM WEINSTONE was elected a member of the National Committee of the CP, USA at a meeting of that Committee on January 22, 1961.

NY T-2 furnished information on April 5, 1964, reflecting that in March, 1964, CLARKE stated that he had ~~been~~ asked to edit a special issue of the magazine, "Presence Africa", to be published in Paris in French and English on the theme, "The Black Revolution in the US". He said this special issue would concern the struggle for civil rights in the United States and the re-awakening of American Negroes to this struggle and potential.

On May 28, 1964, NY T-38 made available information reflecting that CLARKE contacted BETTY GANNETT of the NYSMS on April 8, 1964 and apologized for not getting some material to her. NY T-38 was unable to describe the material which CLARKE mentioned.

BETTY GANNETT TORMEY

NY T-39 advised on August 20, 1964, that BETTY GANNETT TORMEY is a member of the New York District CP Board and is in charge of finances for the District.

NY T-40 advised on April 14, 1964, that [redacted]

(U) [redacted] Washington, D.C., arranged to meet with ESTHER JACKSON and JOHN CLARKE on April 16, 1964. He apologized for the failure of the Legation to send in a subscription to "Freedomways" and said he would subscribe personally. (S)

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NY T-41 advised on June 6, 1964, that, on that date, MALCOLM LITTLE commented that they had been in the process of trying to lay the structure for a new organization which would not be the Muslim organization but would get grass roots support which was not based on religious belief. He indicated that they had held "brainstorm" sessions and that JOHN HENRY CLARKE and six others were assigned the task of going over all the ideas.*

MALCOLM LITTLE

MALCOLM LITTLE is the head of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated, and the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU).

A characterization of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated, and the OAAU each are set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

NY T-1 advised on July 10, 1964, that, on that date, JOHN CLARKE announced that he and his wife were going to Camp Kinderland on the weekend of July 25, 1964.

A characterization of Camp Kinderland is set forth in the Appendix pages of this report.

NY T-1 furnished information on July 9, and 15, 1964, reflecting that JOHN CLARKE had collaborated on a record on African Heritage with RICHARD MOORE and [redacted]

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RICHARD B. MOORE

MOORE was interviewed on April 23, 1956, by SAS [redacted] and [redacted] at which time he admitted that he was a former member of the CP, but said he was not then a CP member. He estimated his period of membership as being from the late 1920's to 1940, at which time he was expelled. However, he declined to discuss why he was expelled.

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He admitted that he was a speaker at a CP sponsored birthday party for WILLIAM PATTERSON on August 26, 1954, in New York City, pointing out that he and PATTERSON are old and cherished friends and that he would speak highly of PATTERSON at any time or place.

NY T-17 advised on September 22, 1961, that MOORE was the Chairman of a reception to welcome home HENRY WINSTON, held on September 7, 1961, at the Hotel Theresa, New York City. NY T-17 said MOORE spoke at the reception and praised the efforts of WINSTON in the struggle for the defense of the Constitution of the United States.

WILLIAM L. PATTERSON

NY T-39 advised on September 16, 1964, that WILLIAM L. PATTERSON is the Chairman of the New York District CP.

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HENRY WINSTON

NY T-31 advised on August 13, 1961, that HENRY WINSTON was elected a member of the National Committee, CP, USA, and Vice Chairman of the Party, at a meeting of the National Committee of the CP, USA, held on August 12 and 13, 1961.



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The Spring, 1964, issue of "Freedomways" describes [redacted] as a New York [redacted] "Freedomways" Editorial Committee.

(U) NY T-42 advised on February 13, 1964, that JOHN CLARKE desired to see FELIX CUMMINGS because they were planning a special issue of "Freedomways" devoted to the West Indies and he wanted to get an article and basic information from CUMMINGS. (S)

(U) NY T-42 also advised on February 13, 1964, that CLARKE told CUMMINGS on that date that an issue was being prepared on the Caribbean area and that he wanted to discuss the details with CUMMINGS. (S)

FELIX A. CUMMINGS

(U) FELIX A. CUMMINGS is registered with the United States Department of Justice under the provisions of the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended, in his capacity as Public Relations and Information Officer of British Guiana. (S)

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The Summer, 1964, issue of "Freedomways" is a special issue devoted to "The People of the Caribbean Area". FELIX CUMMINGS contributed an article, "British Guiana in Transition", to this issue. A footnote to the article describes CUMMINGS as the Head of the British Guiana Public Relations and Information Office in New York City and also the Official Petitioner on Behalf of the British Guiana Government to the United Nations and Personal Representative of Prime Minister CHEDDI JAGAN.

(U) NY T-42 also advised on May 26, 1964, and June 24, 1964, that CLARKE contacted CUMMINGS on those dates concerning the article CUMMINGS was preparing for "Freedomways". (S)

(U) On September 1, 1964, NY T-42 advised that CLARKE was in contact with CUMMINGS concerning his impression of the Caribbean issue of "Freedomways". (S)

(U) NY T-42 advised on June 25, 1964, that, on that date, CUMMINGS discussed with CLARKE the possibility of "Freedomways" issuing certain material which could not be mailed from the British Guiana Public Relations Office. According to NY T-42, CLARKE promised to look into the matter. (S)

(U) NY T-42 advised on July 1, 1964, that CUMMINGS had entertained members of the press corps and that it was indicated that among those who were present was JOHN CLARKE of "Freedomways". (S)

(U) NY T-42 advised on August 7, 1964, that, on that date, CUMMINGS was in contact with CLARKE concerning a new book entitled "The Ordeal of British Guiana" by PHILIP RENO. CUMMINGS said he had been asked to distribute some of these books and suggested that CLARKE display the book for sale purposes on August 16, 1964. CLARKE suggested to him that RICHARD B. MOORE would be amenable to this idea and promised to have MOORE contact CUMMINGS. (S)

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PHILIP RENO

PHILIP RENO executed a signed statement on December 13, 1948, in the presence of THOMAS G. SPENCER and [redacted] Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, in which he related that he was a member of the CP from early 1944 to 1948, at which time he was expelled from the Party.

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(U) NY T-42 advised on August 12, 1964, that CLARKE, on that date, requested the secretary of FELIX CUMMINGS to inform him that RICHARD B. MOORE would like to have the books and wanted them in time to display them on Sunday, August 16, 1964. (S)

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APPENDIX

AFRICAN AMERICAN HERITAGE ASSOCIATION
Formerly Known as Afro-American Heritage
Association

Records of Corporation Division, Secretary of State, State of Illinois, reviewed June 24, 1959, reflect that Articles of Incorporation, Non-Profit, for Afro-American Heritage Association were filed October 3, 1958, giving the purpose of the organization as being "to spread wide and far the history and heritage of people of African descent to Negroes and to the whole American people,..."

A source advised on May 8, 1963, that African American Heritage Association (AAHA), with headquarters at 306 East 43rd Street, Chicago, Illinois, was known as Afro-American Heritage Association until February, 1961. It was founded by ISHMAEL FLORY for the ostensible purpose of teaching African History and culture to American Negroes. AAHA is strongly influenced by the Communist Party (CP) of Illinois. It has a governing board represented by both Communists and non - Communist members and some individuals with strong nationalistic tendencies. This board decides policy, reflecting CP policy on some issues and opposing CP policy on other issues; for example, the CP rejects the concept of Afro-American as a reference term to the American Negro and rejects aspects of nationalism, both of which are reflected in the AAHA program.

FLORY is a member of the Negro Commission, CP of Illinois, and theoretically under the discipline of the CP. He continues to be the guiding force in AAHA.

A second source advised on May 9, 1963, that during the latter part of 1962, the CP of Illinois, South Side Executive Board, worked with ISHMAEL FLORY and CLAUDE LIGHTFOOT, leading CP of Illinois policy-maker,

to organize two AAHA chapters in Chicago Congressional District wards, which, according to FLORY, would provide avenues in the local level to discuss issues and Afro-American history and for the solution of current problems within the context of Marxist theory. These chapters, Crispus Attucks and First Settlers Chapters are under the leadership of South Side Club CP members and their aims include efforts to recruit new CP members and reactivation of ex-CP members.

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APPENDIX

AMERICAN INSTITUTE FOR MARXIST STUDIES

A source advised on April 9, 1963, that on April 7, 1963, at a meeting of the District Committee of the Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA) of New England, held in Boston, Massachusetts, HERBERT APTHEKER stated he was developing an organization called American Institute For Marxist Studies (AIMS), which would eventually legalize the CP. He stated AIMS would publish literature on History, Science, Physics, Archeology and other subjects which would be put out quarterly with various supplements.

A second source advised in December, 1959, that HERBERT APTHEKER was elected to the National Committee, CP, USA, at the 17th National Convention of the CP, USA, held in December, 1959.

A third source advised on June 7, 1963, that on June 3, 1963, HERBERT APTHEKER spoke at the CP, USA, New York District Board meeting concerning AIMS. APTHEKER stated that AIMS would unite and strengthen the CP although the CP would not be connected with it. He stated AIMS was being formed to operate within the scope of the MC CARRAN and SMITH Acts and would legally bring Marxist material and opinions to the attention of American scholars and the general public.

A fourth source advised on May 15, 1964, that, as of that date, AIMS was located on the fifth floor west at 20 East 30th Street, New York City, New York.

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APPENDIX~~SECRET~~ (U)CAMP KINDERLAND

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning Camp Kinderland:

"Camp Kinderland (Hopewell Junction, N.Y.)

- "1. 'The Communist management of six camps in New York State and another in California was exposed by committee investigations and hearings.' Listed among these is Camp Kinderland, children's camp owned and operated since 1951 by Camp Lakeland, Inc.

[redacted] respectively of Camp Lakeland, Inc., 'have been active members of the Communist Party.' (Committee on Un-American Activities, Annual Report for 1955, House Report 1648, January 17, 1956, originally released January 11, 1956, pp. 2, 8, and 9.)"

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APPENDIXFAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE

The April 6, 1960, edition of "The New York Times" newspaper contained a full-page advertisement captioned "What Is Really Happening In Cuba," placed by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC). This advertisement announced the formation of the FPCC in New York City and declared the FPCC intended to promulgate "the truth about revolutionary Cuba" to neutralize the distorted American press.

"The New York Times" edition of January 11, 1961, reported that at a hearing conducted before the United States Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on January 10, 1961, Dr. CHARLES A. SANTOS-BUCH identified himself and ROBERT TABER as organizers of the FPCC. He also testified he and TABER obtained funds from the Cuban Government which were applied toward the cost of the aforementioned advertisement.

On May 16, 1963, a source advised that during the first two years of the FPCC's existence there was a struggle between Communist Party (CP) and Socialist Workers Party (SWP) elements to exert their power within the FPCC and thereby influence FPCC policy. This source added that during the past year there had been a successful effort by FPCC leadership to minimize the role of these and other organizations in the FPCC so that their influence as of May, 1963, was negligible.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

On May 20, 1963, a second source advised that VINCENT "TED" LEE, FPCC National Office Director, was then formulating FPCC policy and had indicated that he had no intention of permitting FPCC policy to be determined by any other organization. This source stated that LEE believed that the FPCC should advocate resumption of diplomatic relations between Cuba and the United States and should support the right of Cubans to manage their revolution without interference from other nations. LEE did not advocate supporting the Cuban revolution per se.

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FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE

The November 23, 1963, edition of "The New York Times" reported that Senator THOMAS J. DODD of Connecticut had called FPCC "the chief public relations instrument of the CASTRO network in the United States." It is to be noted that Senator DODD was a member of the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee which twice conducted hearings on the FPCC.

The December 27, 1963, edition of "The New York World Telegram and Sun" newspaper stated that the pro-CASTRO FPCC was seeking to go out of business and that its prime activity during its lifetime had been sponsorship of pro-CASTRO street rallies and mass picket lines, and the direction of an active propaganda mill highlighting illegal travel-to-Cuba campaigns. Its comparatively brief span of life was attributed to mounting anti-CASTRO American public opinion, the 1962 Congressional hearings which disclosed FPCC financing by CASTRO's United Nations Delegation, and ultimately, the bad publicity which the FPCC received from disclosure of activities on its behalf by suspected presidential assassin, LEE H. OSWALD.

On February 6, 1964, the previously mentioned second source advised that V. T. LEE had recently remarked that the FPCC was dead and that there were no plans to organize another similar organization.

On April 13, 1964, a third source advised that there had not been any FPCC activity in many months and that the FPCC had been dissolved.

HARLEM FREEDOMWAYS FORUM
Also known as Freedomways Forum

A source advised on May 18, 1962, that WILLIAM ALBERTSON had contacted LILLIAN MARTINEZ during May, 1962, at which time he requested her to take the assignment of forming a new organization, the formation of which had been previously discussed at Harlem Communist Party (CP) meetings, which would be called Freedomways Forum and which in appearance would be a non-CP organization but in effect would be a new front for the Harlem CP through which all Harlem CP work would be accomplished.

The source advised on November 6, 1963, that a meeting of a committee specifically selected by the 11th A.D. Club of the Harlem CP was held at 2235 5th Avenue, New York, New York, on November 1, 1963, at which a definite decision was made to establish the Freedomways Forum which would be known as the Harlem Freedomways Forum (HFF). It was unanimously agreed that the HFF would be a broad front formed by the CP not only to discuss the problems of the community but also to serve as a source of recruitment of new members for the CP.

The source advised on April 4, 1964, that the HFF has no headquarters, but uses the address of Freedomways Associates, Inc., 799 Broadway, New York, New York.

A second source advised on November 8, 1962, that WILLIAM ALBERTSON was the Executive Secretary of the New York District, CP, USA.

A third source advised on April 2, 1963, that LILLIAN MARTINEZ was a member of the Harlem Region of the CP, USA.

APPENDIX1.JEFFERSON BOOK SHOP, INCORPORATED

A source provided information in the spring of 1945 which indicated that the Jefferson Book Shop, Incorporated, (JBS) had officially opened on April 1, 1944.

The records of the New York County Supreme Court reflected that on December 3, 1946, papers were filed with the Department of State, State of New York, incorporating the JBS, Incorporated, to sell books and magazines at wholesale and retail among other purposes.

LOUIS F. BUDENZ, former Managing Editor of the "Daily Worker," an East Coast Communist newspaper which suspended publication on January 13, 1958, and a self-admitted member of the Communist Party (CP) until 1945, advised in March, 1947, that the JBS was one of a number of outlets for Communist Party literature which had been set up by the CP.

A second source advised on February 14, 1961, that at a meeting of the New York District CP Staff held that date, DANIEL RUBEL gave a report on the operation of the JBS. He announced that it had shown a small profit in 1960 and that approximately 35 per cent of the sales was of Marxist - Progressive material. A number of suggestions were advanced by those present to improve the sales of CP literature at the JBS and it was announced that 63 young people, who had come into contact with the party through the JBS, were thinking about joining the party and some were recruits into the party.

A third source advised on February 1, 1961, that on that date HY LUMER, CP, USA Educational Director, referred to DANIEL RUBEL as being in charge of literature distribution of the New York District of the CP, USA.

The Address Telephone Directory for the Borough of Manhattan, New York City, as published by the New York Telephone Company on April 20, 1964, lists the JBS as being located at 100 East 16th Street, New York City.

1.APPENDIXMUSLIM MOSQUE, INCORPORATED

The March 13, 1964, edition of "The New York Times," a daily newspaper published in New York, New York, contained an article on page 20 which indicated that MALCOLM X (LITTLE), former national official of the Nation of Islam (NOI) and Minister of NOI Mosque #7, New York, who broke with the NOI on March 8, 1964, publicly announced in New York City on March 12, 1964, that he had formed the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated (MMI). The MMI, according to the article, would be a broadly based politically oriented black nationalist movement for Negroes only, financed by voluntary contributions. In this public statement MALCOLM X urged Negroes to abandon the doctrine of non-violence when it is necessary to defend themselves in the civil rights struggle, and he also suggested that Negroes form rifle clubs to protect their lives and property in times of emergencies in areas where the government is unable or unwilling to protect them.

Incorporation papers of the MMI filed on March 16, 1964, with the Business Section, Clerk of Courts, New York County, New York, New York, reflect that the MMI was incorporated under the Religious Corporation Law of the State of New York to work for the imparting of the Islamic Faith and Islamic Religion in accordance with "accepted Islamic principals." The principal place of worship to be located in the Borough of Manhattan, New York, New York.

During an appearance over KYW - Television, Cleveland, Ohio, on April 7, 1964, MALCOLM X stated that the MMI does not stand for integration, but for complete freedom, justice, and equality for Negroes. He stated that Islam was the religious philosophy of the MMI, while the political, economic and social philosophy was black nationalism.

On May 15, 1964, a confidential source advised that the headquarters of the MMI are located in Suite 128, Hotel Theresa, 2090 Seventh Avenue, New York City, where they were established on March 16, 1964.

NATION OF ISLAM, MOSQUE #7,
NEW YORK CITY

On May 5, 1964, a source advised that the Nation of Islam (NOI) affiliate in New York City is known as Mosque #7, also known as Temple #7, and is located at 102 West 116th Street, New York City. Mosque #7 is part of the NOI headed by ELIJAH MUHAMMAD, with headquarters in Chicago, Illinois. Mosque #7 has two branches; Mosque #7B at 105-03 Northern Boulevard, Queens, New York City, and Mosque #7C at 120 Madison Street, Brooklyn, New York. These branches are part of Mosque #7.

The date Mosque #7 originated in New York City is not known.

However, in connection with the origin of Mosque #7, it should be noted that in 1953 a second source advised that there was a Temple of the NOI (known to source then as the Muslim Cult of Islam) in New York City located at 135th Street and 7th Avenue, as far back as 1947.

In September, 1960, a source advised it was announced at a meeting of the Communist Party, United States of America, (CP, USA), New York District (NYD), Staff, held September 16, 1960, that the People's School for Marxist Studies was founded in September, 1960, as the result of a decision of the CP, USA, NYD. Adult classes were scheduled to start October 17, 1960.

"The Worker," an East Coast Communist newspaper, October 16, 1960, issue, announced the opening of the New York School for Marxist Studies (NYSMS) with general classes beginning October 17, 1960, and Student Committee on Progressive Education (SCOPE) (Youth) Classes beginning October 14, 1960. The address of the School is Room 1922, 853 Broadway at 14th Street, New York, New York.

The records of Pierce Mayer & Greer, 41 East 42nd Street, New York City, reflect that on August 29, 1960, HERBERT APTHEKER leased Room 1922-23, 853 Broadway, New York City, for the period starting October 1, 1960. The premises were to be occupied by a "People's School." On July 3, 1962, HERBERT APTHEKER signed a new lease for Room 1922-23, 853 Broadway, New York City, to start October 1, 1962, which reflects that the premises were to be used as an office for the NYSMS.

During April and May, 1964, a second source furnished information that the NYSMS was then in operation at 853 Broadway, New York, New York.

A third source advised on December 14, 1959, that at the 17th National Convention of the CP, USA, held December 10 - 13, 1959, HERBERT APTHEKER was elected a member of the National Committee of the CP, USA.

The May, 1963, issue of "Political Affairs," self-described as the theoretical organ of the CP, USA, reflects that HERBERT APTHEKER has been replaced as editor of that publication after holding this position for several years.

A characterization of SCOPE is included in the appendix.

APPENDIX

ORGANIZATION OF AFRO-AMERICAN UNITY (OAAU)

On June 28, 1964, MALCOLM X LITTLE, founder and leader of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated (MMI), publicly announced the formation of a new, all Negro, militant civil rights action group to be known as the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU), with himself as Chairman. This announcement was made at a public rally held by the MMI in the Audubon Ballroom, Broadway and 166th Street, New York City.

A printed and published statement of basic OAAU aims read by MALCOLM X at this meeting indicates that it shall include "all" people of African descent in the Western Hemisphere, as well as "our" brothers and sisters on the African continent. It is patterned after the "letter and spirit" of the Organization of African Unity established (by African heads of States) at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, in May, 1963.

A recording of the remarks of MALCOLM X at this meeting indicates that the aim of the OAAU is to eliminate differences between Negroes so they can work together for "human rights," while the initial objective is to "internationalize" the American civil rights movement by taking it to the United Nations. LITTLE condemned the non-violent civil rights movement and claims that Negroes should be taught to protect themselves, when and if necessary. The OAAU will sponsor a program for Negroes of education, politics, culture, economics and social reform.

On August 19, 1964, a confidential source advised that the headquarters of the OAAU are located in MMI headquarters, Suite 128, Hotel Theresa, 2090 7th Avenue, New York City.

Clarke was born on January 1, 1915, at Union Springs, Alabama. He is a dark complected Negro, 5'6" in height, 165 pounds and chunky in build.

A source who has furnished reliable information in the past, has advised that Clarke attended the first and founding meeting of the American Institute of Marxist Studies held on December 19, 1963, and is one of those who are described as "associates" of that organization.

A characterization of Aims is set forth in the Appendix pages.

The Reverend Richard Ashburn, Pastor of the 2nd Baptist Church, Sandusky, Ohio, on October 27, 1961, stated he has known Clarke since 1948, and that Clarke told him that he joined the Communist Party (CP) in the 1930s, but broke with and left the CP in 1942, because he felt the CP was using the Negro race to further their own ends and doing nothing for the Negro as such.

Re: John Henrik Clarke

Clarke was interviewed on January 10, 1962, and stated he never belonged to the CP at any time in his life. He did state he was a subscriber to the "Daily Worker" for a short while, year unknown.

The "Daily Worker" was an East Coast Communist newspaper which ceased publication on January 13, 1958.

The name of John Henrick Clarke appeared as a contributor of a poem in the Fall, 1947 issue of "New Foundations" described in the publishers' charter as a Marxist intellectual and cultural youth magazine.

He was a subscriber to the "Daily Worker" or "The Worker" in 1954. His name also appeared as the signer of a nominating petition sponsored by the People's Rights Party (PRP) for Benjamin Davis for State Senator, 21st Senatorial District in the November 4, 1958 election, NYC.

The PRP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The August 25, 1964 issue of "The Worker" East Coast Communist newspaper, in an article on the death of Benjamin Davis on August 22, 1964, states that he was elected to the Party's National Committee at the Party's last National Convention and was elected by the National Committee to the post of National Secretary of the Party.

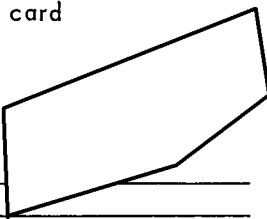

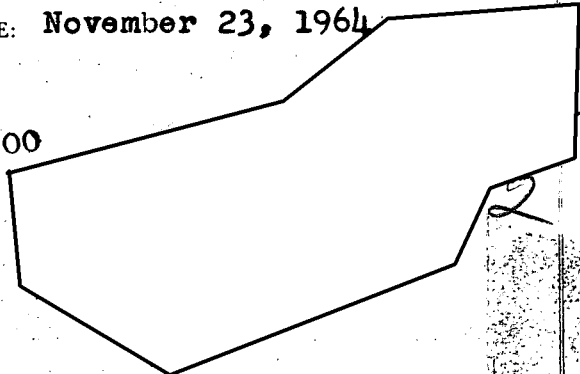

A confidential source recently furnished the following information:

On June 4, 1965, John Henrik Clarke, as Associate Editor of "Freedomways" magazine, contacted Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett, 1360 Turk Street, San Francisco, California, and stated that he was pleased to know that Goodlett had obtained "an all-expense invitation" for him to attend the World Congress of Peace, National Independence and General Disarmament, in Helsinki, Finland, July 10-17, 1965. Clarke said he would be able to attend the Helsinki meeting but because he had to be back in New York on July 21, probably would not be able to make the tour of the Soviet Union as a guest of the Soviet Peace Committee. (U)

Clarke noted that as Director of the Heritage Program at Haryou-Act, he has a staff of new teachers working under him who would be able to do some of his work. He added that on the 21st of July, he had to meet with the Board of Directors of the agency and evaluate the entire Summer Teaching Program. (U)

Clarke also mentioned that if a meeting in Accra, Ghana, materialized for December, he would be pleased to go, and, in both cases, would appreciate knowing from Goodlett what is expected of him. (U)

Party (CP) held in San Francisco. The discussion ended with the conclusion that even though Goodlett did not attend many meetings of this branch, he would continue on the roles of the CP because of the amount of work he did on the outside. (S) (u)

A confidential source advised that Carlton Goodlett, on February 5, 1965, disclosed that he is the only American who attends the World Council of Peace Presidential Committee meetings and further that he attends every meeting. (S) (u)

"The New York Times", July 11, 1965, page 9, columns 1-3, in an article datelined at Helsinki, July 10, 1965, stated that the World Congress for Peace began that day. It stated that the biggest contingent came from the United States and that the group's Chairman was Dr. Carlton Goodlett of San Francisco, Chairman of the Committee for International Peace Action.

On June 16, 1965, Clarke advised Professor J. D. Bernal, F.R.S., Chairman, Preparatory Committee, World Congress for Peace, National Independence and General Disarmament, Luotsikatu, Helsinki, Finland, that he would accept his invitation to attend the Congress. He asked that he be informed of the nature of his participation in the Congress. (S) (u)

On June 23, 1965, Clarke again contacted Professor J. D. Bernal and advised him that he had picked up from Air India's New York Office, the prepaid ticket from New York to London, payment having been made by the Vienna Office. He said he would leave New York via Air India flight Number 106y, at 8:30 PM, on July 7, 1965, arriving in London the following morning. On November 9, 1965, a Special Agent (SA) of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), using a suitable pretext, determined that CLARKE is the Director of the African Heritage Program at HARYOU-ACT in New York City.

"The New York Times, October 28, 1964, page 46, Column 1, described HARYOU-ACT as a Harlem youth project formed by the merging of two organizations, Harlem Youth Opportunities, Unlimited, and Associated Community Teams. It said that the Harlem project is an attempt to improve the status of underprivileged youth.

On June 17, 1965, NY T-5 advised that on June 16, 1965, CLARKE spoke to about 25 Harlem school teachers at the Hotel Theresa, New York City. NY T-5 said that CLARKE is being paid to lecture to Harlem public school teachers by HARYOU-ACT and that these teachers are being lectured on African and Negro history. The source said further that CLARKE also teaches dropouts in the evening at the HARYOU-ACT.

Supra, also advised on November 4, 1965, that according to her records, CLARKE listed his employment as Associate Editor of "Freedomways" magazine and as the Director of the Heritage program at HARYOU-ACT. CLARKE furnished this information on July 7, 1964, when he executed his application at which time he indicated he had been with "Freedomways" for three years and with HARYOU-ACT for one year.

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He indicated that he was receiving a salary of \$5,000.00 from HARYOU-ACT and \$3,750.00 from "Freedomways".

On December 6, 1964, February 14, 1965, April 4, 1965, and July 13, 1965, NY T-4 made available information reflecting that CLARKE, as Associate Editor of "Freedomways", was engaged in activities such as soliciting articles, arranging exchange relationships with foreign publications, publicizing the magazine, and attempting to increase its circulation in this country and abroad.

C. ACTIVITIES INDICATING CP AFFILIATION

NY T-4 furnished information on December 6, 1964, reflecting that in November, 1964, CLARKE, in commenting on the proposed "Freedomways" memorial issue on W. E. B. DU BOIS, stated that HERBERT APTHEKER had not been available but that he and the Managing Editor of the magazine would speak with APTHEKER when he was available. CLARKE noted that he already had spoken to APTHEKER about making a selection of unpublished DU BOIS material.

"The New York Times", August 28, 1963, page 3, contains an article datelined at Accra, Ghana, stating that W. E. B. DU BOIS died on August 28, 1963. It states that he went to Ghana as the guest of President Kwame Nkrumah to become Director of the Encyclopedia Africana, which was sponsored by the Government of Ghana and became a citizen of that country. The article also states that "During his later years, he was active in many left-wing and Communist activities. In the fall of 1961, at the age of 93, he joined the CP."

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NY T-6 advised in December, 1959, that HERBERT APTHEKER was elected to the National Committee of the CP, United States of America (USA), at the 17th National Convention of the CP, USA, held in December, 1959.

On April 4, 1965, NY T-4 advised that on March 22, 1965, CLARKE had contacted the W. E. B. Du Bois Clubs of America, noting that the special issue of "Freedomways" on DU BOIS was then ready for distribution and that they were in the midst of promoting this issue. He said that they were giving the Du Bois Clubs a 25 percent discount on all sales and that the sale and promotion of the special issue could be a fund-raising vehicle for the Du Bois Clubs in the United States. He noted that the chairman of the Upper West Side Du Bois Clubs in New York had taken an allotment of 300 copies for sale.

A characterization of the W. E. B. Du Bois Clubs of America is set forth in the appendix pages.

NY T-4 advised on December 6, 1964, that in November, 1964, CLARKE had been in contact with CARLTON B. GOODLETT of San Francisco, California, at which time CLARKE stated that he had inquired about additional material on the relationship of W. E. B. DU BOIS to the Peace Movement but found nothing of consequence. CLARKE said he would contact HERBERT APTHEKER to see if he might have some articles of this nature and that if there were any, they would be furnished to GOODLETT.

CLARKE also commented that he appreciated GOODLETT's suggestion that he, CLARKE, consider taking a trip abroad in 1965, in connection with the "World Peace Movement". CLARKE noted that he would be free to make such a trip during the summer after GOODLETT had given him some orientation on the

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projection of the Peace Movement "as it relates to our people." CLARKE was agreeable to having GOODLETT recommend him as one of the people willing to attend at least one international meeting during the summer of 1965.

"The Sun Reporter", a weekly newspaper appealing to the Negro population in the San Francisco Bay Area, in its issue of July 28, 1962, set forth that CARLTON GOODLETT was the Chairman of the American delegation that attended the World Congress for General Disarmament and Peace, sponsored by the World Congress of Peace, held in Moscow, from July 9 to 14, 1962.

A characterization of the World Council of Peace is set forth in the appendix pages.

NY T-7 advised on January 24, 1947, that on January 15, 1947, Dr. CARLTON GOODLETT had been discussed at a meeting of the Dewey Davis Branch of the Professional Section of the San Francisco County CP held in San Francisco. The discussion ended with the conclusion that even though GOODLETT did not attend many meetings of this branch, he would continue on the roles of the CP because of the amount of work he did on the outside.

NY T-8 advised that CARLTON GOODLETT, on February 5, 1965, disclosed that he is the only American who attends the World Council of Peace Presidential Committee meetings and further that he attends every meeting.

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"The New York Times", July 11, 1965, page 9, columns 1-3, in an article datelined at Helsinki, July 10, 1965, stated that the World Congress for Peace began that day. It stated that the biggest contingent came from the United States and that the group's Chairman was Dr. CARLTON GOODLETT of San Francisco, Chairman of the Committee for International Peace Action.

On July 13, 1965, NY T-4 ascertained that in June of 1965, CLARKE had contacted CARLTON B. GOODLETT stating that he was pleased to learn that GOODLETT had obtained "an all-expense invitation" for him to attend the World Congress of Peace, National Independence and General Disarmament in Helsinki, Finland, July 10-17, 1965. CLARKE said he would be able to attend the Helsinki meeting but probably would not be able to make the tour of the Soviet Union as a guest of the Soviet Peace Committee because he had to be in New York City on July 21.

CLARKE also notified GOODLETT that if a meeting in Accra, Ghana, materialized for December, he would be happy to attend, and, in both cases, would appreciate knowing from GOODLETT what was expected of him.

The source further learned that in June, 1965, CLARKE advised the Chairman of the Preparatory Committee, World Congress for Peace, Helsinki, Finland, that he would accept his invitation to attend the Congress and asked that he be notified of the nature of his participation in the Congress.

"The Worker", an East Coast Communist newspaper, in its issue of July 18, 1965, page 2, column 1, contains an article, "1,400 from 92 Nations at World Peace Congress",

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which was datelined at Helsinki, Finland. The article states that the largest group of participants came from the United States, which had some 85 official delegates, observers, and invited guests. The article noted that among the ten American Negroes in the group was J. H. CLARKE, "Editor of the magazine, 'Freedomways'". The article noted that the original call to the World Congress was issued by the "hosting World Council of Peace".

On February 14, 1965, NY T-4 ascertained that in January of 1965, CLARKE was requested to furnish the Elizabeth City State College, Elizabeth City, North Carolina, his evaluation of GWENDOLYN MIDLO HALL's personal and professional fitness for a teaching position at that college. NY T-4 said that in February, 1965, CLARKE informed the President of the college that he had known HALL for nearly ten years and had worked with her on a research project. CLARKE said he had no reservations about HALL's personal or professional fitness for the position and recommended her highly.

NY T-9 advised on September 29, 1958, that a meeting of the New York Provisional Committee to Reconstitute the CP, USA, (PCRCP) was held in the Central Plaza Annex, New York City, on September 28, 1959, at which meeting GWENDOLYN HALL and her husband were expelled from membership in the PCRCP.

A characterization of the PCRCP under the heading of the Provisional Organizing Committee for a Marxist-Leninist CP is set forth in the appendix pages.

On January 13, 1964, NY T-10 and NY T-11 advised that HAYWOOD HALL and his wife, GWENDOLYN HALL, continued to reside in Mexico and that both were associating with the American Communist Group in Mexico (ACGM).

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The sources described the ACGM as a loose association of a predominantly social nature of present and/or past members of the CP, USA, and their friends and associates who share a common sympathy for Communism and the Soviet Union.

NY T-4 advised on July 13, 1965, that CLARKE had been in contact with JAMES ALLEN of International Publishers, 381 Park Avenue South, New York City, and that CLARKE had told ALLEN that he had sent him a copy of the Mississippi issue of "Freedomways" and felt that since International Publishers had expanded into the paperback field, this issue of "Freedomways" might be good for ALLEN's "new world paperback" series. CLARKE asked ALLEN to consider this.

NY T-12 advised on June 27, 1962, that based on his knowledge of ALLEN's attendance at meetings of the CP, USA, National Committee and National Executive Committee as well as other activities, ALLEN is a member of the National Committee of the CP, USA.

NY T-13 advised that on April 11, 1962, ALLEN signed a legal document in which he described himself as President of International Publishers.

A characterization of International Publishers is set forth in the appendix pages.

On May 25, 1965, NY T-14 advised that, at a meeting of the Friday Night Forum, held in Newark, New Jersey, on the night of May 21, 1965, CLARKE, the Associate Editor of "Freedomways", spoke on the subject of "the impact of Africa on the modern world".

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With independent political power, the black revolution can boldly move forward in advancing the interests of the masses."

The article listed the names of interim committee members and included was the name of JOHN HENRIK CLARKE, Editor of "Freedomways".

The "New York Journal American" in its issue of January 23, 1965, page 4, contained the column, "Inside Labor" by VICTOR RIESEL. This column included the following comments:

"A PHALANX of left-wing Negro activists, led by the Reverend MILTON GALAMISON and JESSE GRAY, appear to be on a collision course with Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING. Allied with the GALAMISON-GRAY bloc are the globe-trotting MALCOLM X and other militants who want to use New York as the base for an all-Negro political party.

"From inside their newly organized coalition, known as the Federation for Independent Political Action, comes word that they want to run Mr. GALAMISON for Mayor and Mr. GRAY for a seat on the City Council this Fall on a straight Negro ticket.

"They are realists, so they, of course, have little hope of polling heavily for their front runner, who now is specializing in school boycotts. But they believe they can roll up enough votes to put themselves in a bargaining position in the future--and possibly get GRAY on the City Council.

"They unveiled their organization during a little-noticed, all-day parley Dec. 19 after issuing a call for 'Black independent political action.'

"'With independent political power, the black revolution can boldly move forward in advancing the interests of the masses,' their statement said. The conferences created an interim action committee of eight men including Mr. GALAMISON, GRAY, MALCOLM X and JOHN HENRIK CLARKE, editor of Freedomways, founded by Mrs. W.E.B. DU BOIS.

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"This coalition's effort to launch an all-Negro political machine runs contrary to the broad philosophical concepts of Dr. KING and other national Negro and liberal leaders now directing the vast civil rights offensive."

A characterization of the "National Guardian" is set forth in the appendix pages.

NY T-24 advised on November 20, 1958, that JESSE GRAY had been the organizer for the Harlem Region of the CP but that this position was terminated during November, 1958.

NY T-25 advised on January 24, 1964, that according to WILLIAM PATTERSON, Chairman of the New York District CP, JESSE GRAY is no longer a CP member but is friendly to the CP.

MALCOLM X LITTLE was the head of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated, and the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU) who was murdered in New York City on February 21, 1965.

Characterizations of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated, and the OAAU are set forth in the appendix pages.

NY T-4 advised on April 4, 1965, that in March, 1965, CLARKE claimed that the OAAU was "born" in the living room of his apartment and that he wrote the first draft of the organization's Constitution. CLARKE added that he was "very close to the man that was the man and the movement in question."

NY T-26 advised on June 30, 1965, that on June 19, 1965, on the occasion of the fifth anniversary of "Liberator" Magazine, a writer's conference on the theme, "Black Writers at the Crossroads" was held at St. Luke's Church, 141st Street and Convent Avenue, New York City.

The source stated that the conference was divided into two sections for each session and that one section discussed the question "Is Pro-Black Necessarily Anti-White". NY T-26 stated that a member of this panel was JOHN HENRIK CLARKE.

The November, 1964, issue of "Liberator" is self-described as "the voice of the Afro-American protest movement in the United States and the liberation movement of Africa."

NY T-4 advised on February 14, 1965, that in January, 1965, CLARKE noted that he was compiling a book on the life and career of W. E. B. DU BOIS for "Presence Africaine", a publishing house in Paris, France, for distribution in Africa. CLARKE further noted that this book on DU BOIS would be translated into French and then distributed in the French-speaking areas of Africa.

NY T-27 advised on February 21, 1963, that the official organ of the International Society of African Culture is "Presence Africaine" published in Paris, France. NY T-27 also stated that in 1956, Negro intellectuals in Paris, attending the first conference of Negro artists and writers, organized the Society of African Culture, the purpose of which was to unite by bonds of interests and friendship all cultured Negroes.

NY T-4 further advised on February 14, 1965, that in February, 1965, CLARKE stated that he had recently completed editing a special issue of "Presence Africaine" which was devoted to aspects of the civil rights struggle. CLARKE said the book is entitled, "Black Revolution in the USA".

NY T-4 advised on May 23, 1965, that in May, 1965, CLARKE notified the Administrative Secretary of "Presence Africaine", Paris, France, that he was collecting additional material on the civil rights movement to supplement material he had submitted on the project, "Black Revolution in the USA".

APPENDIXFREEDOMWAYS ASSOCIATES, INC.

The records of the New York Secretary of State, Albany, New York, show that the certificate of incorporation of Freedomways Associates, Inc., was filed on March 2, 1961.

The Winter, 1965, issue of "Freedomways" is self-described as "A Quarterly Review of the Negro Freedom Movement" published by Freedomways Associates, Inc., 799 Broadway, New York City. This issue lists JOHN HENRIK CLARE as Associate Editor, ESTHER JACKSON as Managing Editor, and JOHN L. DEVINE as Art Editor of the publication.

A confidential source made available information on July 1, 1964, reflecting that JOHN HENRIK CLARKE attended the first and founding meeting of the American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS) which was held on December 19, 1963, and continued on January 10, 1964.

This source also made available information on August 14, 1964, reflecting that CLARKE is an "associate" of AIMS.

The Winter, 1963, issue of "Freedomways," page 44, states that ESTHER JACKSON became one of the leaders of the Southern Negro Youth Congress (SNYC) which existed from 1937 to 1949.

The SNYC has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

According to a confidential source, ESTHER JACKSON is the wife of JAMES JACKSON, whom the source identified on October 14, 1964, as being a member of the National Committee of the Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA.)

On January 30, 1961, SYLVIA M. BRENNER DEVINE, 415 South 50th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, advised that her former husband, JACK DEVINE, mentioned on December 17, 1960, that he was still in the CP and that the CP is his whole life.

On July 24, 1963, a confidential source described JOHN DEVINE as a CP member.

On May 24, 1961, a source advised that a report was given on "Freedomways" at a meeting of the National Board, CP, USA, held on May 24, 1961. It was stated that the original plan called for the publication to be openly Marxist, but that it was later decided it would not be avowedly a Marxist publication. Editorials are in the hands of a mixed group of Marxists and non-Marxists. It was stated that the central purpose of "Freedomways" is to develop a theory and positive criticism of currents in the Negro Movement, as well as to raise the level of understanding and discussion taking place in Negro life today and to project a socialist and pro-Soviet orientation.

On May 25, 1961, a source advised that "Freedomways" was set up for the CP, USA, by JAMES JACKSON.

FRIDAY NIGHT FORUM
(NEWARK, NEW JERSEY)

A source advised in November, 1960, that a forum for "lefts and progressives" was mentioned as coming into existence at a meeting of New Jersey COMMUNIST PARTY (CP) leaders held in Newark, New Jersey, at the end of October, 1960. DAVID ROCKLIN, known to the source as a CP member, and other active CP members were mentioned as being associated with the effort to establish such a public sounding board.

A second source advised in December, 1960, that a letter had been prepared announcing the organization of the FRIDAY NIGHT FORUM (FNF) and advertising the first meeting as being scheduled for January 20, 1961. According to the letter, the FNF was to present a series of lectures, one each month, at the Continental Ballroom, in Newark, New Jersey. These lectures were to be on the "political events of these times" and were to feature qualified speakers on such topics as the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA), Cuba, Africa, Asia, civil rights, co-existence, and national and international events.

A third source advised on May 26, 1965, that during the past four years, the FNF has continued to present a series of speakers on such topics as international relations, abolition of the HCUA, Africa, Asia, and Vietnam, education and social reforms in the Soviet Union, disarmament, Soviet youth activities, and other topics of current interest. These speakers have been presented since the inception of the FNF at a series of meetings held on Friday evenings in Newark, New Jersey.

The third source advised on May 26, 1965, that FNF meetings are currently being held at the Continental Ballroom, Broad Street, Newark, New Jersey, and that LEO RITZ is the 1964-1965 chairman.

During November, 1955, a self-admitted member of the CP from the mid-1930's until late 1944, advised that during the period from just prior to World War II, until late 1944, he knew LEO RITZ to be a member of the Clinton Hill Branch of the New Jersey CP.

MUSLIM MOSQUE, INCORPORATED (MMI)

The March 13, 1964 edition of "The New York Times," a daily newspaper published in New York, New York, contained an article on page 20 which indicated that MALCOLM X (LITTLE), former national official of the Nation of Islam (NOI) who broke with the NOI on March 8, 1964, publicly announced in New York City on March 12, 1964, that he had formed the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated (MMI). The MMI, according to the article, would be a broadly based politically oriented black nationalist movement for Negroes only, financed by voluntary contributions. In this public statement, MALCOLM X urged Negroes to abandon the doctrine of non-violence when it is necessary to defend themselves in the civil rights struggle, and he also suggested that Negroes form rifle clubs to protect their lives and property in time of emergencies in areas where the government is unable or unwilling to protect them.

Incorporation papers of the MMI filed on March 16, 1964, with the Business Section, Clerk of Courts, New York County, New York, New York, reflect that the MMI was incorporated under the Religious Corporation Law of the State of New York to work for the imparting of the Islamic Faith and Islamic Religion in accordance with "accepted Islamic principals." The principal place of worship to be located in the Borough of Manhattan, New York, New York.

The May 23, 1964 edition of the "New York Amsterdam News," a weekly Negro newspaper published in New York City, contained an article by columnist JAMES BOOKER in which he indicated that he had heard that the visit by MALCOLM X with Muslim leaders during his African tour has changed him to become more religious.

On October 6, 1964, a confidential source advised that the MMI is apparently affiliated with the true orthodox Islamic Religion through its affiliation with the Islamic Foundation (of New York), 1 Riverside Drive, New York City. The only teachings of the MMI are on the Islamic Religion.

This confidential source advised on May 17, 1965, that the headquarters of the MMI are located in Suite 128, Hotel Theresa, 2090 Seventh Avenue, New York, New York, where they were established on March 16, 1964. These headquarters are shared with the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU) which was also headed by MALCOLM X.

MALCOLM X was assassinated on February 21, 1965 while addressing an OAAU rally at the Audubon Ballroom, Broadway and 166th Street, New York City.

APPENDIX1.NATION OF ISLAM, MOSQUE #7

On May 3, 1965, a source advised that the Nation of Islam (NOI) affiliate in New York City is known as Mosque number 7, and is also referred to as Temple number 7. It is part of the national organization of the NOI headed by Elijah Muhammad with headquarters in Chicago, Illinois.

There are three branches of Mosque number 7; One at 105-03 Northern Boulevard, Queens (known as Mosque number 7B), another at 120 Madison Street, Brooklyn (known as Mosque number 7C), and one at 878 Prospect Avenue, Bronx (known as Mosque number 7D).

There is no branch in Manhattan, although plans are being made to obtain a located which will be the principal meeting place of the Mosque and will be known as Mosque number 7.

The date Mosque number 7 originated in New York City is unknown but in this connection it should be noted that in 1953, a second source advised that there was a Temple of the NOI (known to source then as the Muslim Cult of Islam) in New York City located at 135th Street and 7th Avenue, as far back as 1947.

APPENDIXORGANIZATION OF AFRO-AMERICAN
UNITY, INCORPORATED (OAAU)

On June 28, 1964, MALCOLM X LITTLE, founder and leader of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated (MMI), publicly announced the formation of a new, all Negro, militant civil rights action group to be known as the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU), with himself as Chairman. This announcement was made at a public rally held by the MMI in the Audubon Ballroom, Broadway and 166th Street, New York City.

A printed and published statement of basic OAAU aims read by MALCOLM X at this meeting indicates that it shall include "all" people of African descent in the Western Hemisphere, as well as "our" brothers and sisters on the African continent. It is patterned after the "letter and spirit" of the Organization of African Unity established (by African heads of States) at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, in May, 1963.

A recording of the remarks of MALCOLM X at this meeting indicates that the aim of the OAAU is to eliminate differences between Negroes so they can work together for "human rights," while the initial objective is to "internationalize" the American civil rights movement by taking it to the United Nations. LITTLE condemned the non-violent civil rights movement and claims that Negroes should be taught to protect themselves, when and if necessary. The OAAU will sponsor a program for Negroes of education, politics, culture, economics, and social reform.

On May 17, 1965, a confidential source advised that the headquarters of the OAAU are located in MMI headquarters, Suite 128, Hotel Theresa, 2090 7th Avenue, New York City.

MALCOLM X was assassinated on February 21, 1965, while addressing an OAAU rally at the Audubon Ballroom, New York City.

APPENDIX

W.E.B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA

A source has advised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party (CP), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of setting in motion forces for the establishment of a new national Marxist-oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. The delegates to this meeting were cautioned against the germ of anti-Soviet and anti-CP ideologies. These delegates were also told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself.

A second conference of over 20 persons met in Chicago on December 28-29, 1963, for the purpose of initiating a "call" to the new youth organization and planning for a founding convention to be held in June, 1964.

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19-21, 1964, at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time the name W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention. The aims of this organization, as set forth in the preamble to the constitution, are: "It is our belief that this nation can best solve its problems in an atmosphere of peaceful coexistence, complete disarmament and true freedom for all peoples of the world, and that these solutions will be reached mainly through the united efforts of all democratic elements in our country, composed essentially of the working people allied in the unity of Negroes and other minorities with whites. We further fully recognize that the greatest threat to American democracy comes from the racist and right wing forces in coalition with the most reactionary sections of the economic power structure, using the tool of anti-communism to divide and destroy the unified struggle of the working people. As young people in the forces struggling for democracy, we shall actively strive to defeat these reactionary and neo-fascist elements and to achieve complete freedom and democracy for all Americans, thus enabling each individual to freely choose and build the society he would wish to live in. Through these struggles we feel the American people will realize the viability of the socialist alternatives."

APPENDIX

W.E.B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA

The constitution further states that this new organization shall be a membership organization open to individuals, or if five or more people so desire a chapter can be formed which shall in turn be guided by the policies and principles of the parent organization.

The second source has also advised that at the founding convention it was voted that the organization should be temporarily headquartered in San Francisco, California, although no specific physical location was decided upon. This same source advised on June 29, 1964, that the temporary headquarters of this organization is 1007 McAllister Street, San Francisco, which is the headquarters of the W.E.B. DuBois Club of San Francisco.

Both sources have advised that at the founding convention two officers were elected:

- PHILIP CHAPIN DAVIS - President
- CARL ELLENGER BLOICE - Publications Chairman

A third source has advised that on October 26, 1962, PHILIP DAVIS attended a CP recruiting class held at 1579 Scenic Avenue, Berkeley, California.

A fourth source has advised that CARL BLOICE, reporter for the "People's World" newspaper, was, on April 3, 1964, elected to the newly organized San Francisco County Committee of the CP.

The "People's World" is a west coast communist newspaper published weekly in San Francisco, California.

A. RESIDENCE

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On September 21, 1966, [redacted] A and S Management Corporation, 309 Lafayette Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, advised that JOHN HENRIK CLARKE and his family are residing in apartment 19N at 333 Lafayette Avenue, Brooklyn, New York.

B. EMPLOYMENT

On October 26, 1966, NY T-1 furnished a copy of the Statement of Ownership, Management and Circulation of the magazine "Freedomways" which was filed on October 1, 1966. This Statement lists JOHN HENRIK CLARKE as the Associate Editor of the magazine "Freedomways".

A characterization of Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, publishers of the magazine "Freedomways" is set forth in the appendix pages.

JOHN HENRIK CLARKE is listed as the Associate Editor of "Freedomways" in the Fall, 1965, Winter, 1965, Spring, 1966 and Summer, 1966 issues of the magazine. CLARKE contributed an article to the Fall, 1965 issue of the magazine entitled "Lerone Bennett: Social Historian". He also contributed book reviews to the Winter and Spring, 1966 issues.

On November 18, 1965, February 4, 1966, and May 22, 1966, NY T-2 furnished information reflecting that CLARKE was receiving a weekly salary of \$65.20 from Freedomways Associates, Incorporated.

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On December 3, 1965, and March 2, 1966, Special Agents (SAs) of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) observed CLARKE entering the building at 799 Broadway, New York City, wherein are located the offices of Freedomways Associates, Incorporated.

On September 23, 1966, a SA of the FBI, using a suitable pretext, determined that CLARKE is the director of the African Heritage Program at HARYOU-ACT, 181 West 135th Street, New York City.

"The New York Times," October 28, 1964, page 46, Column 1, described HARYOU-ACT as a Harlem youth project formed by the merging of two organizations, Harlem Youth Opportunities, Unlimited, and Associated Community Teams. It said that the Harlem project is an attempt to improve the status of underprivileged youth.

On November 18, 1965, February 4, 1966, and May 22, 1966, NY T-2 made available information reflecting that CLARKE, as Associate Editor of "Freedomways" magazine, had been active on behalf of the magazine soliciting articles and book reviews, promoting the magazine, attempting to increase its circulation in the United States and Overseas, establishing an exchange relationship with "The New African" in London, England, and handling problems arising out of the non-receipt of magazine orders.

NY T-4 advised on May 26, 1966, that on May 22, 1966, an affair was held on the occasion of the Sixth Anniversary of "Freedomways" at The Village Gate, New York City, and that JOHN CLARKE was among those who attended this affair.

On January 25, 1966, NY T-5 furnished a copy of a letter announcing a benefit to be held for "Freedomways" at Town Hall, New York City, on February 19, 1966. The letter called for support of the benefit because of the constant need for funds by the magazine. CLARKE, as Associate Editor, was one of the signers of the letter.

C. ACTIVITIES INDICATING COMMUNIST PARTY (CP) AFFILIATION

On March 30, 1966, NY T-6 furnished a copy of an invitation to a testimonial dinner honoring HERBERT APTHEKER on the occasion of his 50th Birthday, the publication of his 20th book, and the second anniversary of the American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS).

This dinner was held on the evening of April 28, 1966, at the New York Hilton Hotel, New York City. The invitation set forth a list of sponsors and the name of JOHN HENRIK CLARKE was included in this list.

HERBERT APTHEKER

NY T-7 advised on June 26, 1966, that at the 18th National Convention of the CP, United States of America (USA), in New York City, in June, 1966, HERBERT APTHEKER was elected to the Party's National Committee.

A characterization of AIMS is included in the appendix pages.

On November 18, 1965, NY T-8 made available information reflecting that in August, 1965, the circulation manager of "The African Review" Accra, Ghana, contacted New Era Books advising this organization that JOHN HENRIK CLARKE of "Freedomways" had given New Era Books as a possible distributor for "The African Review" in the United States.

A characterization of New Era Books is set forth in the appendix pages.

On January 25, 1966, NY T-9 furnished information which dealt in part with the C.L.R. JAMES 65th Birthday Fund Committee. It stated that the purpose of the committee was to establish a sustaining fund to help support C.L.R. JAMES for a few years. It said that a substantial committee had been formed and that JOHN HENRIK CLARKE was a member of the committee.

C.L.R. JAMES

NY T-10 advised on August 1, 1958, that JAMES was one of the co-founders of the Johnson Forest Group (JFG), who, in 1953, was deported from the United States as an undesirable alien.

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A characterization of W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America is set forth in the appendix pages.

D. MISCELLANEOUS

NY T-15 advised on February 18, 1966, that an Authors Meet the Public discussion took place in the Countee Cullen Library, 104 West 136th Street, New York City, and that the meeting was a memorial for the late MALCOLM X. NY T-15 advised that the two authors who attended were ALEX HALEY, author of the Autobiography of MALCOLM X, and JOHN CLARKE of "Freedomways". NY T-15 stated both related personal anecdotes they had experienced concerning MALCOLM X and that CLARKE was one of the men in the select "brain trust", which planned the creation of the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU).

MALCOLM X LITTLE was the head of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated, and the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU) who was murdered in New York City on February 21, 1965.

Characterizations of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated, and the OAAU are set forth in the appendix pages.

NY T-16 advised on February 23, 1966, that on February 21, 1966, a memorial meeting was held in a public school located on 135th Street between Seventh Avenue and Lenox Avenue, New York City, which meeting was sponsored by the MALCOLM X Memorial Committee. One of the speakers who eulogized MALCOLM X was JOHN CLARKE.

NY T-15 on February 23, 1966, NY T-17 on March 1, 1966, and NY T-18 on March 9, 1966, furnished similar information concerning the memorial meeting of February 21, 1966.

STUDIES, Also Known As AIMS

A source advised on April 9, 1963, that on April 7, 1963, at a meeting of the District Committee of the Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA) of New England, held in Boston, Massachusetts, HERBERT APTHEKER stated he was developing an organization called American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS), which would eventually legalize the CP. He stated AIMS would publish literature on History, Science, Physics, Archeology and other subjects which would be put out quarterly with various supplements.

A second source advised on June 30, 1966, that HERBERT APTHEKER was elected to the National Committee, CP, USA, at the 18th National Convention of the CP, USA, held June 22-26, 1966, in New York City.

A third source advised on June 7, 1963, that on June 3, 1963, HERBERT APTHEKER spoke at the CP, USA, New York District Board meeting concerning AIMS. APTHEKER stated that AIMS would unite and strengthen the CP although the CP would not be connected with it. He stated AIMS was being formed to operate within the scope of the McCarran and Smith Acts and would legally bring Marxist material and opinions to the attention of American scholars and the general public.

A fourth source reported on August 29, 1966, that AIMS was located on the fifth floor west of 20 East 30th Street, New York, New York, and issues a "Newsletter" every other month. This source made available the information that AIMS issues publications and holds symposiums concerning Marxism.

FREEDOMWAYS ASSOCIATES, INC.

The records of the New York State Secretary of State, Albany, New York, show that the Certificate of Incorporation of Freedomways Associates, Inc., was filed on March 2, 1961.

On May 24, 1961, a source advised that a report was given on "Freedomways" at a meeting of the National Board, Communist Party, U.S.A. (CPUSA), held on May 24, 1961. It was stated that the central purpose of "Freedomways" is to develop a theory and positive criticism of currents in the Negro Movement, as well as to raise the level of understanding and discussion taking place in Negro life today and to project a socialist and pro-Soviet orientation.

On May 25, 1961, a second source advised that "Freedomways" was set up for the CPUSA by JAMES JACKSON.

The Second Quarter, 1966, issue of "Freedomways," self-described as "A Quarterly Review of the Negro Freedom Movement" published by Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, 799 Broadway, New York City, lists the following as its editorial staff:

JOHN HENRIK CLARKE, Associate Editor
ESTHER JACKSON, Managing Editor
J. H. O'DELL, Associate Managing Editor
JOHN L. DEVINE, Art Editor

A third source made available information on July 1, 1964, indicating that JOHN HENRIK CLARKE attended the first and founding meeting of the American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS) which was held on December 19, 1963, and continued on January 10, 1964.

This source also made available information on August 14, 1964, indicating that CLARKE is an "Associate" of AIMS.

On March 16, 1966, a fourth source advised that JAMES JACKSON, accompanied by his wife, ESTHER JACKSON, was scheduled to depart on March 25, 1966, from the United States en route to Moscow to attend the 23rd Congress of the CP of the Soviet Union. This source described JAMES JACKSON

This source advised in July, 1962, that as of that period, [] was considered by the CPUSA, as being a member of its National Committee.

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On January 30, 1961, SYLVIA M. BRENNER DEVINE, 415 South 50th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, advised that her former husband, JACK DEVINE, mentioned on December 17, 1960, that he was still in the CP and that the CP is his whole life.

On July 24, 1963, a fifth source described JOHN DEVINE as a CP member.

MUSLIM MOSQUE, INCORPORATED (MMI)

The March 13, 1964, edition of "The New York Times", a daily newspaper published in New York, New York, contained an article on page 20 which indicated that MALCOLM X (LITTLE), former national official of the Nation of Islam (NOI) who broke with the NOI on March 8, 1964, publicly announced in New York City on March 12, 1964, that he had formed the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated (MMI). The MMI, according to the article, would be a broadly based politically oriented black nationalist movement for Negroes, only, financed by voluntary contributions. In this public statement, MALCOLM X urged Negroes to abandon the doctrine of non-violence when it is necessary to defend themselves in the civil rights struggle, and he also suggested that Negroes form rifle clubs to protect their lives and property in time of emergencies in areas where the government is unable or unwilling to protect them.

Incorporation papers of the MMI filed on March 16, 1964, with the Business Section, Clerk of Courts, New York County, New York, New York, reflect that the MMI was incorporated under the Religious Corporation Law of the State of New York to work for the imparting of the Islamic Faith and Islamic Religion in accordance with "accepted Islamic principals". The principal place of worship to be located in the Borough of Manhattan, New York, New York.

The May 23, 1964, edition of the "New York Amsterdam News", a weekly Negro newspaper published in New York City, contained an article by columnist JAMES BOOKER in which he indicated that he had heard that the visit by MALCOLM X with Muslim leaders during his African tour has changed him to become soft in his anti-white feelings and to become more religious.

On October 6, 1964, a confidential source advised that the MMI is apparently affiliated with the true orthodox Islamic Religion through its affiliation with the Islamic Foundation (of New York), 1 Riverside Drive, New York City. The only teachings of the MMI are on the Islamic Religion.

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~~SECRET~~APPENDIX2.MUSLIM MOSQUE, INCORPORATED (MMI)

This confidential source advised on May 17, 1965, that the headquarters of the MMI are located in Suite 128, Hotel Theresa, 2090 Seventh Avenue, New York, New York, where they were established on March 16, 1964. These headquarters are shared with the Organization of Afro-American Unity, Incorporated (OAAU) which was also headed by MALCOLM X.

MALCOLM X was assassinated on February 21, 1965, while addressing an OAAU rally at the Audubon Ballroom, Broadway and 166th Street, New York City.

This same confidential source advised on September 8, 1965, that the activities of the MMI following the death of MALCOLM X were limited to the teaching of classes in the Islamic religion and a class in judo for self-protection. These classes were held regularly until the latter part of July, 1965, when they were discontinued. Since then, the MMI has held no meetings and there has been absolutely no activity by the MMI which appears to be completely "dead".

NEW ERA BOOKS
(Formerly World Books)

According to the records of the Foreign Agents Registration Section, United States Department of Justice, Washington, D.C., PHILIP FRANKFELD, doing business as World Books, 747 Broadway, New York 3, New York, filed a registration statement dated September 26, 1961, pursuant to Section 2 of the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended. He listed his foreign principals as follows:

Mezhdunorodnaya Kniga
Moscow, USSR

Guozi Shudian
Peking, China

FRANKFELD stated the nature and purpose of his representation of each Foreign Principal was "to import books, periodicals, and publications sold by foreign principals, to advertise and promote sales of same; to obtain subscriptions for such periodicals."

Records of the Foreign Agents Registration Section, United States Department of Justice, Washington, D.C., contain a letter from FRANKFELD, dated February 17, 1964, which contains the following statement:

"P.S. Starting February 1, 1964, the name of my firm was officially changed legally to: New Era Books. I am still sole owner, the address is the same, etc." A stamp at the bottom reads, "New Era Books (Formerly World Books), 80 East 11th Street, Rm. 212, New York, New York, 10003."

A source advised on April 20, 1965, that New Era Books (formerly World Books) (NEB) continues to operate as a Communist Party (CP) USA literature outlet and that FRANKFELD is a current member of the CP, USA.

The source advised on May 13, 1966, that NEB is located in Room 212, 80 East 11th Street, New York, New York.

ORGANIZATION OF AFRO-AMERICAN
UNITY, INCORPORATED (OAAU)

On June 28, 1964, MALCOLM X LITTLE, founder and leader of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated (MMI), publicly announced the formation of a new, all Negro, militant civil rights action group to be known as the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU), with himself as Chairman. This announcement was made at a public rally held by the MMI in the Audubon Ballroom, Broadway and 166th Street, New York City.

A printed and published statement of basic OAAU aims read by MALCOLM X at this meeting indicates that it shall include "all" people of African descent in the Western Hemisphere, as well as "our" brothers and sisters on the African continent. It is patterned after the "letter and spirit" of the Organization of African Unity established (by African heads of States) at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, in May, 1963.

A recording of the remarks of MALCOLM X at this meeting indicates that the aim of the OAAU is to eliminate differences between Negroes so they can work together for "human rights," while the initial objective is to "internationalize" the American civil rights movement by taking it to the United Nations. LITTLE condemned the non-violent civil rights movement and claims that Negroes should be taught to protect themselves, when and if necessary. The OAAU will sponsor a program for Negroes of education, politics, culture, economics, and social reform.

MALCOLM X was assassinated on February 21, 1965, while addressing an OAAU rally at the Audubon Ballroom, New York City.

On February 28, 1966, a confidential source advised that the president and head of the OAAU is ELLA CALLINS, a half-sister of the late MALCOLM X, who resides in Boston, Massachusetts.

On April 12, 1966, the same confidential source advised that the headquarters of the OAAU are located in Suite 128, Hotel Theresa, 2090 Seventh Avenue, New York City.

On April 13, 1965, a second confidential source advised that on March 26, 1965, the OAAU filed a Certificate of Incorporation with the Department of State, State of New York, Albany, New York, and henceforth the organization's true name will be Organization of Afro-American Unity, Incorporated.

W. E. B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA (DCA)

A source has advised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party (CP), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of setting in motion forces for the establishment of a new national Marxist-oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. The delegates were told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself.

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19-21, 1964, at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time the name W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America (DCA) was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention. The aims of this organization, as set forth in the preamble to the constitution, are: "It is our belief that this nation can best solve its problems in an atmosphere of peaceful coexistence, complete disarmament and true freedom for all peoples of the world, and that these solutions will be reached mainly through the united efforts of all democratic elements in our country, composed essentially of the working people allied in the unity of Negroes and other minorities with whites. We further fully recognize that the greatest threat to American democracy comes from the racist and right wing forces in coalition with the most reactionary sections of the economic power structure, using the tool of anti-Communism to divide and destroy the unified struggle of the working people."

Over the Labor Day weekend, 1965, the DCA held a conference in Chicago, Illinois, and a new slate of officers was elected to the National Executive Committee (NEC) of the DCA. Since Labor Day, 1965, identities of those serving on the NEC has varied; however, according to a third source as of May, 1966, thirteen of the fifteen members of the NEC were members of the CP in the San Francisco Bay area.

As of July, 1966, the headquarters of the DCA was located at 180 North Wacker Drive, Chicago, Illinois.

B. Employment

The Fall, 1966, Winter, 1967, Spring, 1967 and Summer, 1967 issues of "Freedomways" magazine, all list JOHN HENRIK CLARKE as its associate editor. CLARKE contributed a book review to the Fall, 1966 issue, an introduction to the section of the Winter, 1967 issue devoted to The Ghetto, an article "African History Reconsidered", to the Spring, 1967 issue, and an article "The Early Years of ADAM POWELL" to the Summer, 1967 issue. The magazine is self-described as "A Quarterly Review of the Negro Freedom Movement", published by Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, at 799 Broadway, New York City. Each year's issues begin with the Winter issue and end with the Fall issue.

A characterization of Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, publisher of the magazine "Freedomways" is set forth in the appendix pages.

On April 24, 1967, NY T-3 furnished a copy of a form letter from Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, dated April 21, 1967, announcing that the subscriptions to the magazine "Freedomway" were up for renewal.

Enclosed with this announcement was a notice on the availability of books which could be purchased from "Freedomways". Among these was a book "American Short Stories", edited by JOHN HENRIK CLARKE. This notice described CLARKE as "Editor of 'Freedomways' magazine and Director of the Heritage Teaching Program for HARYOU-ACT".

On November 28, 1967, a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), using a suitable pretext determined that CLARKE is the Director of the African Heritage Program at HARYOU-ACT, 181 West 135th Street, New York City.

On November 1, 1967, CLARKE was observed by a Special Agent of the FBI leaving the building at 799 Broadway, New York City. He was later observed entering the building at 181 West 135th Street, New York City.

"The Worker", November 29, 1966, Page 5, Column 2, contained an announcement that "Freedomways" magazine was sponsoring its fourth annual theater benefit at the Longacre Theater at 8 PM on December 1, 1966, of the play "My Sweet Charlie".

On the night of December 1, 1966, among the persons observed entering the Longacre Theater between the hours of 7:40 PM and 8:40 PM was JOHN HENRIK CLARKE.

"The Worker" is an East Coast Communist newspaper.

C. Other Activities

NY T-4 advised on March 10, 1967, that a memorial program to honor MALCOLM X was held on Sunday, February 19, 1967, at the Faith Temple, 1763 Amsterdam Avenue, New York, New York. NY T-4 stated that approximately 500 people attended and that among those who spoke was JOHN H. CLARKE, a teacher who spoke on MALCOLM X and the Negro movement.

NY T-5 advised on February 21, 1967, that on the afternoon of February 19, 1967, a memorial for MALCOLM X was held at the Faith Temple in New York City. NY T-5 stated that the speakers included a person believed to be JOHN CLARKE.

On April 5, 1967, NY T-5 identified a photograph of JOHN HENRIK CLARKE as the person who spoke at the MALCOLM X memorial on February 19, 1967.

MALCOLM X LITTLE was the head of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated, and the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU) who was murdered in New York City on February 21, 1967.

Characterizations of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated and the OAAU are set forth in the appendix pages.

NY T-6 advised on June 22, 1967, that a memorial meeting to honor the memory of MIKE GOLD was held on the evening of June 16, 1967, in Town Hall, New York City and was sponsored by American Dialog. NY T-6 stated that JOHN HENRIK CLARKE was one of the speakers, all of whom payed tribute to GOLD.

A characterization of American Dialog appears in the appendix attached hereto.

"The Worker", June 25, 1967, Page 10, Columns 1 and 2, contained an article "MIKE GOLD Memorial Honors Devotion of Working Class". The article noted that eight hundred persons gathered in Town Hall the previous Friday night to honor the memory of MIKE GOLD. The article set forth the names of the speakers and a comment from each of them. It listed JOHN HENRIK CLARKE of "Freedomways" as one of the speakers and noted that CLARKE said that GOLD "defined the role of the writer to awaken the genius of the people so that they can free themselves".

"The Worker", May 21, 1967, Page 3, Columns 3, 4 and 5, contained an article on the death of MIKE GOLD on May 15, 1967, in San Francisco, California. It described him as having been an author and columnist for "The Worker" for 32 years. It noted that he joined the Communist Party (CP) "shortly after it was founded and to which he adhered till the day he died".

The November-December, 1966, issue of "American Dialog", Volume 3, Number 3, contains the statement in its masthead, "American Dialog is published bi-monthly by Dialog Publications, 32 Union Square, Room 804, New York 10003. Copyright 1966 by Dialog Publications, Inc."

On July 2, 1966, a second source advised that JOSEPH FELSHIN attended the 18th National Convention of the Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA) held in New York City, from June 22 through June 26, 1966, as a delegate.

A third source advised on July 27, 1966, that JOSEPH NORTH, a delegate to the 18th National Convention of the CP, USA, held in New York City, from June 22 through June 26, 1966, was elected to the National Committee of the CP, USA, on June 26, 1966.

The Address Telephone Directory for the Borough of Manhattan, New York City, as published by the New York Telephone Company, on March 20, 1967, lists "Dialogue Publications, Inc." as being located at 32 Union Square, New York, New York.

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning "Mainstream":

AMERICAN INSTITUTE FOR MARXIST STUDIES

A source advised on April 9, 1963, that on April 7, 1963, at a meeting of the District Committee of the Communist Party, United States of America (CPUSA), of New England, held in Boston, Massachusetts, HERBERT APTHEKER stated he was developing an organization called American Institute for Marxist Studies (AIMS), which would eventually legalize the CP. He stated AIMS would publish literature on History, Science, Physics, Archeology and other subjects which would be put out quarterly with various supplements.

A second source advised on June 30, 1966, that HERBERT APTHEKER was elected to the National Committee, CPUSA, at the 18th National Convention of the CPUSA, held June 22-26, 1966, in New York City.

A third source advised on June 7, 1963, that on June 3, 1963, HERBERT APTHEKER spoke at the CPUSA, New York District Board meeting concerning AIMS. APTHEKER stated that AIMS would unite and strengthen the CP although the CP would not be connected with it. He stated AIMS was being formed to operate within the scope of the McCarran and Smith Acts and would legally bring Marxist material and opinions to the attention of American scholars and the general public.

A fourth source reported on August 29, 1966, that AIMS issues a "Newsletter" every other month. This source also made available the information that AIMS issues publications and holds symposiums concerning Marxism.

A fifth source advised on May 9, 1967, that as of that date, AIMS was located on the fifth floor west of 20 West 30th Street, New York, New York.

NATION OF ISLAM, FORMERLY REFERRED
TO AS THE MUSLIM CULT OF ISLAM, ALSO
KNOWN AS MUHAMMAD'S TEMPLES OF ISLAM

In January, 1967, a source advised ELIJAH MUHAMMAD has described his organization on a nationwide basis as the "Nation of Islam" and "Muhammad's Temples of Islam."

On May 5, 1967, a second source advised ELIJAH MUHAMMAD is the national leader of the Nation of Islam (NOI); Muhammad's Temple of Islam No. 2, 5335 South Greenwood Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, is the national headquarters of the NOI; and in mid-1960 MUHAMMAD and other NOI officials, when referring to MUHAMMAD's organization on a nationwide basis, commenced using either "Mosque" or "Temple" when mentioning one of "Muhammad's Temples of Islam."

The NOI is an all-Negro organization which was originally organized in 1930 in Detroit, Michigan. MUHAMMAD claims to have been selected by ALLAH, the Supreme Being, to lead the so-called Negro race out of slavery in the wilderness of North America by establishing an independent black nation in the United States. Members following MUHAMMAD's teachings and his interpretation of the "Koran" believe there is no such thing as a Negro; the so-called Negroes are slaves of the white race, referred to as "white devils", in the United States; and the white race, because of its exploitation of the so-called Negroes, must and will be destroyed in the approaching "War of Armageddon."

In the past, officials and members of the NOI, including MUHAMMAD, have refused to register under the provisions of the Selective Service Acts and have declared that members owe no allegiance to the United States,

On May 5, 1958, the first source advised MUHAMMAD had, upon advice of legal counsel, tempered his personal statements and instructions to his ministers concerning the principles of his organization in order to avoid possible prosecution by the United States Government; however, he did not indicate any fundamental changes in the teachings of his organization.

NATION OF ISLAM (CONTINUED)

On May 2, 1966, a third source advised MUHAMMAD had, in early July, 1958, decided to de-emphasize the religious aspects of the teachings of Islam and to stress the economic benefits to be derived by those Negroes who joined the NOI. This policy change, according to MUHAMMAD, would help him acquire additional followers and create more interest in his programs.

ORGANIZATION OF AFRO-AMERICAN UNITY, INCORPORATED (OAAU)

On June 28, 1964, MALCOLM X LITTLE, founder and leader of the Muslim Mosque, Incorporated (MMI), publicly announced the formation of a new, all Negro, militant civil rights action group to be known as the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU), with himself as Chairman. This announcement was made at a public rally held by the MMI in the Audubon Ballroom, Broadway and 166th Street, New York City.

A printed and published statement of basic OAAU aims read by MALCOLM X at this meeting indicates that it shall include "all" people of African descent in the Western Hemisphere, as well as "our" brothers and sisters on the African continent. It is patterned after the "letter and spirit" of the Organization of African Unity established (by African heads of States) at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, in May, 1963.

A recording of the remarks of MALCOLM X at this meeting indicates that the aim of the OAAU is to eliminate differences between Negroes so they can work together for "human rights", while the initial objective is to "internationalize" the American civil rights movement by taking it to the United Nations. LITTLE condemned the non-violent civil rights movement and claims that Negroes should be taught to protect themselves, when and if necessary. The OAAU will sponsor a program for Negroes in education, politics, culture, economics, and social reform.

MALCOLM X was assassinated on February 21, 1965, while addressing an OAAU rally at the Audubon Ballroom, New York City.

On April 13, 1965, a confidential source advised that on March 26, 1965, the OAAU filed a Certificate of Incorporation with the Department of State, State of New York, Albany, New York, and henceforth, the organization's true name will be Organization of Afro-American Unity, Incorporated.

On May 8, 1967, the first confidential source advised that the headquarters of the OAAU is located at 224 West 139th Street, New York, New York, which is the residence of ELLA COLLINS.

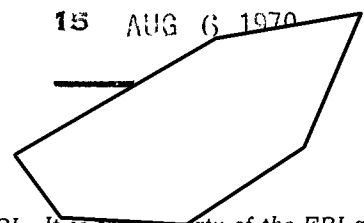

Review of the CLARKE file disclosed he is a Negro, born 1/1/1915, at Union Hill, Alabama, is 5'6" in height, 165 pounds, has black hair, brown eyes, dark complexion.

He has been an Associate Editor of Freedomways Magazine for a number of years and in November, 1965, was also Director of African Heritage Program at Haryou-Act, New York City. As of August, 1970, CLARKE was no longer affiliated with Haryou-Act, but was then a Professor of Black and Puerto Rican studies at Hunter College, New York City.
